CHURCH IS OPTIONAL

Every one of you who reads this article has a story to tell about your religion. Some of you were raised faithfully in the Lutheran Church or some other Christian church. You might say you had a devout childhood but then lapsed away in college or when you married, only now to not attend or to attend church seldom.



Recent surveys indicate that there is a massive shift away from religion in America as nearly 23% of the population indicates they are not part of any religion. When asked what religion they identify with, they simply indicate no religion in particular. Essentially, one in ten Americans say religion is not important to them.

But these who are detached from religion and the church who might be churchless also believe religion is very important. 44% of the "nones" said religion is important to them. So, this would indicate they still care about religion even though they don't attend church.

And there are those who have switched religions, no longer part of the church in which they were raised. Of course, many people leave their childhood religion, only to return to them later in life.

Switching is most prevalent in Christian denominations. For example, look at how many Lutherans, raised in the Lutheran church have switched to another religion or denomination. It is true that denominational loyalty has waned.

Do people have less reasons to stick with the church today because they have access to information about other faiths? Many young people go off to college, embrace evolution, and begin to hold to other beliefs that are contrary to what they were taught.

It surely seems that people today are more willing to tolerate religious differences than they were in the past. In 1960, 81% of people married someone of their own faith. Now, the number of "interfaith"

marriages has been increasing and only 61% percent marry someone of their own faith.

Among the Millennials, aged 18-33, we find that one third have no religious affiliation. But, we also find that those who express "none" as a religious affiliation is occurring among Americans of all ages.

At this point in our history in America, about 71 percent of the population identifies as Christian, down from 78 percent just seven years ago.

Denominations are getting older. The median age in mainline denominations is 52, two years older than the median age in 2007.

When we read and learn of these surveys which tell us much about religion and, in particular, Christianity, we realize that religion is not losing its influence in our culture. Religious influence is still there among all ages.

The numbers do suggest that Americans are allowing for more latitude in how they practice their faiths. There is disintegration as people leave their flocks for other flocks, and, for many, the church is simply irrelevant to their lives. It seems that flexibility is the watchword in looking at the church and Christianity.

In the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, average attendance on Sunday is about 40% of the membership. Church attendance with many is an option like a birthday party, athletic event, travel, yard work, or some other activity that is chosen above God's house on Sunday.

Our Lord did not consider church optional. The Bible is certainly clear that we are to hear God's Word regularly and Holy Communion is not optional. We are to receive the Lord's body and blood in the communion of the church. We need to come to hear the Law and Gospel preached. We need the fellowship of fellow believers in the body of Jesus.

HYMNS THAT SING OF CHRIST: LSB 676 "BEHOLD A HOST ARRAYED IN WHITE"

Behold a hose, arrayed in white,
Like thousand snowclad mountains bright!
With palms they stand; Who is the band
Before the throne of light?
These are the saints of glorious fame,
Who from the great affliction came
And in the flood
Of Jesus' blood
Are cleansed from guilt and shame.
They now serve God both day and night;
They sing their songs in endless light.

Their anthems ring
As they all sing
With angels shining bright.

Despised and scorned, they sojourned here; But now, how glorious they appear! Those martyrs stand,

God's throne forever near.

Now God has wiped away their tears,

And freed them from their fears.

They now enjoy the Sabbath rest, The heav'n ly banquet of the blest; The Lamb, their Lord, At festive board

O blessed saints in bright array Now safely home in endless day, Extol the Lord,

Sustained you on the way.
The steep and narrow path you trod;
You toiled and sowed the Word abroad;

O saints, sing with that happy throng!
Lift up one voice;

Let heav'n rejoice In our Redeemer's song!

One of the most beloved hymns of the Church Triumphant written by Hans Adolf Brorson. As you read the words slowly the believer's future is revealed. What joy fills our hearts as we thank Christ for such a priceless and wonderful gift. A free gift, free only to us, of course, but the cost was everything to our Lord Jesus Christ. Paid for by His life blood. This hymn is a shout of alleluia from the church of God.

Hans Adolf Brorson (1694-1764) was born in Randrup, Denmark, son of a Lutheran pastor. He was taught theology, philology (linguistics), history, and philosophy at University of Copenhagen. Despite some bouts of ill health, he was ordained in 1722. He accepted his first call to Randrup, his native city. He wrote and published many hymns. He became one of Denmark's greatest hymn writers with hymns numbering in the thousands. We have one other in our hymnal; *I Walk in Danger All the Way*

The tune is *Den Store Hvide Flok*, a seventeenth century well known, loved Norwegian folk tune. The tune is used in all American hymnals as well as in the Norsk Koralbok (1936) popularized by the St. Olaf College choir, Northfield, Minnesota.

The interesting harmonization is by Edvard Grieg from his Opus 3, No. 10, for four part male choir and baritone solo.

Back to School/Head Start on Christmas

Right about now your mailbox is probably overflowing with back-to-school sale flyers, or at least flyers featuring back-to-school items (next month will start Christmas!). You may be past the stage where you are worried about those types of things but remember in looking at technology we are also looking at how technology can connect us to our children and grandchildren.

In looking at various tech articles/newsletters and asking questions of those much smarter than I am, here are a few items that are worth mentioning. They might even be items that you yourself would find handy.

Please note that brand names on items are not an endorsement but the pictures were copied from Amazon and you know how many words a picture represents.



This first item is a memory stick that works with micro USB ports like a phone or tablet and then connects to your computer USBport. Some say they are compatible with iPhone/tablets as well as Android-based devices.

Make sure to read and research very carefully for device specifics. Prices vary as well as capacity so it is important to know what your phone/tablet can read.

Purpose: Can be used for data transfer, additional storage, large files that would exceed capacity of your phone and its SD card or perhaps you don't want this data to reside in a permanent or semi-permanent place on your phone or tablet but you need it periodically.

At one time or another we have all been caught where the battery on our phone or tablet is running low and no access to the means to recharge. Enter the portable external battery power bank.



These come in a variety of sizes and shapes, not to mention weight and colors, so take these thoughts under consideration. The one shown here has some additional features as it is a multi-purpose 4-in-one emergency tool device. It is

a flashlight, charger, stainless steel glass smashing hammer and a belt cutter (are you thinking Swiss army knife) as well as being water-resistant. Not the lightest of all small chargers, but not the heaviest coming in at 8.8 oz. Specs say there is enough power to fully charge a cellphone.

TECHNOLOGY

This last item should interest those who do not subscribe to the notion that a messy desk is a

sign of genius, or where you have limited electrical outlets to plug in your various devices at one location, and they spread are now throughout the house. OK, confess, how many times have you had to hunt for your cellphone, tablet, laptop because you couldn't remember



where you plugged in the charger?


This could be a handy item in a dorm room where each occupant has multiple technology devices and not only is space limited but so are outlets. Or, for families where each member has at least a cellphone and you have to barter for charger space to comply with the rule that cellphones should not be in the bedroom. Perhaps with multiple devices per family member one outlet in each bedroom can accommodate charging needs with a charger station. Just remember to turn the devices away from where you are sleeping so you are not getting light from the device screens.

Charging stations come in various configurations and styles so again make sure you research carefully. Also make sure that the station has built-in overload protection as well as overcharging or short circuit protection and voltage distribution. As well, take note of which platforms (iDevices or Android) can be plugged into the station.

Remember there is no product recommendation implied or guarantee of performance for any of these items. These are simply a few items that you might not otherwise have seen or considered.

Technology has its place and a never ending flow of new devices is always on the horizon. Our jobs are to not let technology master or entice us to purchase, but to use technological devices as godly tools and master those tools as we live our lives to the glory of God.



There is no cost for the event. We are suggesting a freewill offering of \$20.


