ONE CUP OR MANY

"In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when he had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying, Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me" — The Words of Institution of Jesus from Matthew, Mark, Luke, and St. Paul

I am an advocate for the common cup, also known as the chalice which is used to distribute the blood of Jesus in the Holy Supper. However, I also

believe that I and many Christians have been negligent in addressing this matter over the past century when individual cups as an innovation found their way into the Lutheran Church.

It would be greatly beneficial if pastoral care and sound teaching were used to guide Christians back to the use of the chalice in our congregations, as we are informed and catechized from Holy Scripture and our Lutheran Confessions.

When individual cups were first introduced by Reformed churches in the 19th century there was no scriptural motivation, but only fear for hygiene.

Initially, Lutherans opposed the use of individual cups and there is a record of the Pennsylvania Ministerium in 1895 that did not accept their use.

C.F.W. Walther, the first president of the LCMS, in his "Pastorale" book which guides pastors in the administration of their office assumes that the only thing in use is, or would be the chalice, though he often refers to it as "the cup."

In the 1964 book, "What an Altar Guild Should Know" by Rev. Paul H.D. Lang he indicates: "Communion of the sick is an extension of the Holy Communion service from the church to those who are unable to attend. Holy Communion is true to its name, for it is truly a "communion" in which the many are one body as they partake of the one bread and one cup (I Cor.10:16-17). It is for the sake of



symbolizing this communion that the Lutheran Church retains the common cup, the chalice. The chalice is the preferred choice of the Lutheran Church, for without exception the Word of God speaks of the cup in the singular in Holy Communion contexts. In the Words of Institution, Christ says that all should drink of the one cup, and we are told that they all drank of the one cup. This cup is called the cup of the Lord."

Today the majority of our LCMS congregations use individual cups as

they were influenced by the Reformed adoption of these, as those Reformed churches only used grape juice and took a merely symbolic stance and belief on the Lord's Supper.

The truth is that if weren't for health considerations, individual cups would not have been introduced in the Reformed churches or in the Lutheran churches. The ironic thing is that the scientific community, in many studies, has demonstrated that fears of detrimental effects upon those who commune with the chalice are absolutely unfounded. In fact, those who have concerns about the spread of germs are better off taking the chalice over individual cups.

Can I get sick from the common cup? The answer is no. There is a greater risk of getting sick from the airborne pathogens and personal contact with others. In a study by the American Society for Microbiology in 1997, it was concluded that there is no significant difference in health among those who receive communion and those who do not.

Yet, somehow there is a thought that drinking Jesus' blood in an indvidual cup is safer than drinking the blood of Christ in the chalice.

The chalice, made of a noble metal, gold, is nonporous. The Altar Guild servers have washed their hands and carefully prepared the elements. The alcohol in the wine serves as an antiseptic. When

The importance of the Lord's Supper in the corporate worship of Lutherans as well as in the life of its members is readily attested by the numerous Lutheran hymn writers dwelling on this subject and the inclusion of many such hymns in their hymnals. Originally, this hymn contained 28 stanzas! Despite that, it was commonly sung during distribution.

The text of this hymn was written by Friedrich Christian Heyder (1677 - 1754). Little is known of him other than he was born in Merseburg, Germany. He became a deacon and from 1706 - 1741, he served as pastor in Zorbig, near Halle, where he died.

The tune is another author unknown. *Ich Sterbe Taglich* was included in a manuscript collection in Leipzig Municipal Library that had 295 tunes, many of them familiar tunes from the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries.



little cups are placed and handed out, fingertips have touched the rims of the glasses. If communicants pick the little cups out of the tray there is even more contact with countless others.

But the point is this. No one has any assurance that germs will never enter this distribution, and given that fact, one is actually better off receiving the chalice than individual cups from a hygiene point of view.

Ultimately, this is a matter of faith and belief. Unworthy reception killed people in Corinth. I Corinthians 11:27-30 indicates that it was unbelief, not hygiene that caused sickness and death.

Today, we have an opportunity to once again teach and recover the preferred chalice of the Lord. The aim is not to eliminate individual cups, but to teach toward the chalice from Scripture and our Lutheran Confessions. In the end, if all were to partake of the chalice, then, of course, there would be no need for individual cups. The pastor's portable communion kit, used in hospitals and homes, only utilizes the chalice and there is no issue with this.

Why would we not want to use the chalice that brings us the blood of Christ? As we know, its use is scriptural, the exact method that Jesus used, emphasizes unity in the body of Christ, is in line with the practice of Jesus, the apostles, the early church, the church catholic, and our forefathers, is a confession that Christ would not institute anything that is harmful to our health, is simple and a practical way to distribute the blood of Jesus, and is more in line with our doctrine of the real presence and those churches that confess it.

The gift of the Lord's Supper, His body and blood, is to be treasured as a pure gift of the Gospel of forgiveness. The chalice is a symbol of grace. Its use among us, and I hope and pray with increasing use, gives us an opportunity to catechize about what we believe, teach, and confess about the Lord's Supper and the Gospel of salvation in and through Christ Jesus as we partake of the feast now and in eternity from the cup of the Lord.

Dear Family of Supporters,

Awhile ago, our family started a tradition where we make a scroll listing events, big or small, that were blessings which had occurred that year. We would roll it up, tie a ribbon around it and add it to the Christmas tree as a "decoration" of sorts. Either before or after writing the new one for the year, we enjoyed reading the previous years' blessings. While the scroll hasn't been written consistently each year, this year I have a note to myself to do it this year as it is a blessing in itself to see how God has sustained and worked in our lives that year.

As we think over the blessings of this year, our letter to you all will speak directly to the blessings you have been a part of to our family, and the ministry God has called us to here in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Here is a list of what we remember (and there are so many more that we may not even be aware of!):

- Teaching the Word of God the Gospel message in particular to students who will then teach it to
 others,
- Gifts of memory sticks for MA students with multiple resources for their studies and ministries,
- A visit to Nekemt to see students' congregation, home and Bible school,
- Friendship with Kassim, a former Muslim, who has a passion for sharing the Gospel with Muslims and us learning from him,
- Witnessing and participating in the graduation of the BTh IV students who will now return to their home villages and cities to share the Gospel message,
- Teaching students whose home is as far away as Guinea Bissau and South Sudan,
- Ongoing new friendships and sports participation for our children with others from here in Ethiopia as well as: Australia, Spain, Italy, England, Romania, Finland, Sweden, Denmark and South Korea.



Welcome to a new feature in our newsletter. The purpose of this feature is to give parents, extended family and friends, information on books that are appropriate for children and that will assist in building a solid biblical foundation from an early age.

This project is a joint effort of Pastor Jordan and Pat Lillie, as well as *all* of you. The goal is to review one book at a time and to put a copy of the resource in our church's "family room." Please don't hesitate to ask questions about any of the books or any topics for which you might want us to search for resources.

We may occasionally reference a technological tool when that is appropriate, but our stated objective is to put books into hands and hearts. Technology will be mentioned when that is an adjunct to the book not as a replacement.



The first book for review is titled *My Little ABC Liturgy Book*, written by Pastor Gaven Mize. It is available from Amazon, and a copy is in the family room. Pastor Jordan also has a few copies available so ask him about getting one.

There is no age reference given for this book and by

the title you might think this would only be for ages 2-6; however, there are some explanations that will draw in your older children, maybe even teenagers if they have not yet been catechized.

The colors throughout the book are soft, reflective of what you might find in church. The illustrations are not photographic nor cartoonish but *softer* drawings which do not jar the senses for younger children especially. Elements, such as the altar carry throughout the book. While not specifically mentioned, there are seasonal changes to the color of the altar cloth and to the pastor's vestments (perhaps another research topic). There are symbols throughout the book, not all explained, but these might help draw in some older children to investigate the meaning. The elements of the liturgy highlighted are not exhaustive as they focus on only one element, but that again could be a challenge to slightly older children to find another element beginning with...

My Little ABC Liturgy Book will not be outgrown within a couple of months or even a year. A suggestion would be to bring the book with the children into church and after the service go to the appropriate location or element (it might even be in the hymnal) and let them compare what is in front of them with what is in their book. Pastor Jordan would be more than happy to lead an investigation after service and answer questions. If your children are shy about asking a question, ask it for them: for example, "What are the vestments you are wearing today and what do they mean?"

Another suggestion would be to incorporate this into a car travel game. For example, go through the alphabet with various options, foods, animals, names and then add in liturgy ABCs. Use your imagination and find new connections to reinforce the liturgy elements and thereby deepen your children's, and maybe even your own, understanding of the liturgy.

Share with others how you have used a particular book and if it has been helpful. And, we would love to see a picture of your child or children reading one of the books.
