INSTRUCTION FIRST, THEN PRAYER

"Luther's Small Catechism with Explanation (2017 edition)" has now been given to all officers and board members of this parish with the expectation of reading, learning, and growing in the teachings of God's Word.

All are certainly encouraged and requested to obtain a copy of this new book for personal edification and growth as we heed the admonition to "follow the pattern of the sound words that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus." (I Timothy 1:13)

Our upcoming "Praying Luther's Small Catechism" catechesis meeting each Thursday will provide opportunity to teach our catechumens and all in the basic doctrines of Holy Scripture as we see the catechism as a life book of instruction for our daily doctrine and practice.

All too often, the Small Catechism has only been experienced as a textbook for two years of youth catechism under the proverbial "Pastor Frickenschmidt" of the past. Or, we provide it to adults who are catechized in the pastor's instruction class for new members and confirmands.

But, the Small Catechism, written in 1529 by Dr. Martin Luther, is intended for families and all Christians so that they would know Christ and true Christian doctrine derived from Holy Scripture. The catechism is intended to not only be an instruction book, but a book of prayer for the Christian.

Prayer is speaking to God in thoughts, words, and expressions that reflect what He has first said to us. Therefore, the Small Catechism is intended as a prayer book of words that God supplies us for conversation and meditation.

Luther gives us a simple way to pray that provides a pattern and guide. It is "I.T.C.P."

Instruction, Thanksgiving, Confession, Prayer Hebrews 13:17 says, "Obey your leaders and



submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you."

Basing I.T.C.P on this passage, we learn the following.

Instruction: We are to listen carefully and heed the teaching of our pastor when he speaks the Word of God. The pastor is duty-bound to preach and teach only according to God's Word and our Lutheran

Confessions. He will give account of his ministry on judgment day. Our pastor is called to watch over souls and we desire to bring him joy, not grief, as he fulfills his duties. We are blessed with pastors for our spiritual benefit. We are blessed to attend Bible class and Divine Service as our pastor teaches us God's Word.

Thanksgiving: We thank Jesus for our pastors, for He provides them as gifts to the church. We thank God for our pastor's sermons and teachings, for the sacraments that he administers to us. We are grateful for his sermons which expose our sins and clearly proclaim the gospel of forgiveness in Jesus. Above all, we thank our pastors for delivering Christ and His gifts in Word and Sacrament faithfully.

Confession: All too often we fail to pray for our pastors. We often do not pay attention to his teaching and sermons. Many will sin and gossip about the pastor and his family. We really deserve to have our faithful pastor taken away. As sinners, we have sinned against our pastors, but we confess this to the Lord and desire to faithfully obey our pastor as he teaches the Word, encouraging him in his difficult office.

Prayer: Pray that your pastor be faithful to God and His Word. It is not his calling to be liked or popular, or to make the church grow. Pray that your pastor have courage and faithfulness in the power of the Holy Spirit. Thank God



HYMNS THAT SING OF CHRIST: LSB 463 "CHRIST THE LORD IS RISEN TODAY; ALLELUIA"

Christ the Lord is ris'n today; Alleluia! Christians, hasten on your way; Alleluia! Offer praise with love replete, Alleluia! At the paschal victim's feet. Alleluia!

For the sheep the Lamb has bled, Alleluia! Sinless in the sinner's stead. Alleluia! Christ the Lord is ris'n on high; Alleluia! Now He lives, no more to die. Alleluia!

Hail, the victim undefiled, Alleluia! God and sinners reconciled, Alleluia! When contending death and life, Alleluia! Met in strange and awesome strife. Alleluia!

Christians, on this holy day, Alleluia! All your grateful homage pay; Alleluia! Christ the Lord is ris'n on high; Alleluia! Now He lives, no more to die. Alleluia!

This stirring hymn is based on the Latin sequence of the 11th century, the authorship of which is credited to Wipo (d.c. 1050) of Burgundy, noted successor of Notker at the monastery in St. Gall, chaplain to German Emperors Konrad 11 and his son Heinrich 111.

Partly for utilitarian reasons, but more due to the natural desire for creativity, there arose in the Roman liturgy of the ninth to the thirteenth centuries textual additions to the authorized liturgical texts in what are called tropes, and as an activity called troping. Tropes, formerly in the Western Church, a phrase, sentence, or verse interpolated into some part of the liturgy. Tropes ranged from a few amplifying words interpolated between Kvrie Eleison, to more lengthy explanatory sentences and even entire poems. This practice represented an important development in the history of the chorale. Originally derived from the Eastern Church, they were sung or shouted by German Christians on all possible occasions as procession, pilgrimages, burials, and in some minor liturgical services.

The tune is *Llansfair*, a simple but pleasing Welsh tune indicative of early Welsh tunes in its economy of form. The name *Llansfair* is the initial part of the long name of a little village in Wales. Written by Robert Williams (1781-1821). Williams was born at Mynydd

Ithel, Llanfechell on the island of Anglesey in North Wales, where he spent his entire life. Blind from birth, he earned a living as a skilled basket maker. It is said he had such a keen ear, he could accurately jot down a tune after a single hearing. He was evidently also a popular singer. This tune appeared in his manuscript book, and it is not known whether he actually composed the tune, as he was a gifted musician, or whether it was something he jotted down after hearing it. In his manuscript book, he called this tune *Bethel*.







Technology Upgrades

One of the questions that frequently come up is whether or not to upgrade your technology devices. If you listen to the latest and greatest hype from the various manufacturers you would be getting a new device(s) every year. Is this really necessary? Consider a few things:

- Are my devices working well?
- What are my needs for various devices?
- Are my devices still supported by the manufacturer?
- Do my devices still interface with the technology devices of family, friends and co-workers?

Consider first your needs versus wants and desires to have the latest. If you are in a work environment where electronic communication is absolutely necessary, you may have company issued devices and these may automatically be upgraded on a regular basis. The question then to ask is whether or not your personal devices will still sync with the company devices should the need arise.

Remember the days when you bought something and if anything went wrong it could be repaired? Not always the case today and replacement parts may not be available or cost more than a new device. Frequently products are made with a planned life span. The average life of a cellphone for example is around 18 months; average tablet life is around 5 years; the average laptop life is 2- 4 years. There are exceptions and usage is a big factor, also how you care for your devices.

Most of us probably have a love/hate relationship with our various devices. Technology while bringing many uses to our lives also intrudes on our lives. Emails, texts, tweets, social media etc. have their place but they have also caused many problems. Electronic communication does not give us the visual ques that face-to-face encounters do; however, a quick text of "running late, be there in 5 minutes" can eliminate ruffled feathers.

The device to consider seriously is your cellphone. Many have eliminated land lines and now only use



their cellphone. The need is still to make and receive phone calls but carefully think and evaluate if there are other uses you should consider. Have a dialogue with your family members if you are of a more mature age. For example, if there is concern about how you are doing during the day, a morning and afternoon text could eliminate anxiety and not require a long telephone conversation that may or may not be convenient. If you are a person who has always been independent and fearless you might not realize that your family might be anxious now about you taking off for a walk by yourself. You can do this via texting or you can use an app that tracks where you are going and when you return.

Other options to consider if your cellphone needs upgrading is what medical information apps might be good to have. There are many that deal with medication, have reminders built in, pharmacy information etc. Talk with your doctor's office and pharmacy about whether or not they are plugged into one of these apps or can make recommendations.

An app we haven't talked about much is the record function. Newer cellphones may have this built in, but if not, there are many apps available. Why a record app? Do you always remember everything your doctor or pharmacist tells you about a medication? What if you recorded (with permission of course) their instructions? Maybe you are waiting someplace and you have a brilliant idea but no paper; record it. A memo app with a voice feature is a great place to keep your shopping list.

Before your cellphone dies, think about its age and whether or not you might be ready to consider one that has more functions—a smartphone.

A very godly use of technology is personal safety so consider carefully if you might need to upgrade your cellphone.



Did you know that there are Children's Bulletins available on Sunday? These are on the resource table in the narthex; just ask an usher.

There are actually two resources available. One is keyed to the Sunday readings and can be used with a variety of ages, even if just to color. It looks like this:



If you miss a Sunday or are going on a trip contact the office. The office manager has a file of past issues located in the library. These would also be useful for helping keep sick kids occupied.

The other resource is geared for slightly older children, perhaps 5 or 6 to about age 10. This resource is meant to help with focus and listening skills. Some assistance will

probably be needed especially at first; however, this could be a great tool for family discussion and help everyone carry what they hear on Sunday in their heart throughout the week. The bulletin looks like this:
