It is very common for most web pages to have a section titled "About Us." This typically explains the nuts and bolts of the organization and business so people understand more about them.

For a church web page to explain "About Us" leads us somewhere different, for the church's identity and essence is not about the people, building, or activities. It is about Jesus.

Often, people in the church will comment about how they like the pastors, the people, the youth group, or the music. There are many things to like in a church, to be sure, but is this the focal point of a church?

"Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, that we may present mature in Christ. For this I toil, struggling with all his energy that he powerfully works within me." – Colossians 1:28,29

This Word of God clearly indicates the essential nature of the church's proclamation is Jesus Christ, the true Savior of the world who gives forgiveness, eternal life, and salvation to all who believe.

Consider the task of the church to warn all people with God's law, telling them that without Christ they are lost forever. Our warning is a call to repent of sin and to consider the consequences of unbelief.

The church's task is to teach, that is, to



catechize with the Word of God and the pastor clearly is to be not only a shepherd to the flock, but a teacher of the Word. Bible classes, instruction, and study is vital in the church. Sermons that catechize and impart the Scripture are essential.

And the goal is to present children of God who were born again in holy baptism and who grow in their knowledge, understanding,

and insights into God who has revealed himself in the person and work of Jesus.

We all have a tendency to boast of our accomplishments or to somehow market Christianity to others by packaging things nicely, in order to appeal to people's senses.

Christians can certainly tend to think of their work and efforts in the church by their various areas of service. All of these are valued and benefit others.

But, the real worker in the church and the real servant of all is God. He works powerfully. He forgives sins. He gives his body and blood in the Holy Communion. He baptizes sinners and washes them of their sins. He brings souls to eternal life and will raise their bodies on the last day.

So, is it about us? No.

It is about Him. To Him be the glory and praise as we make Christ known to all.



HYMNS THAT SING OF CHRIST: LSB 487 "Come You Faithful, Raise the Strain"

Come, you faithful, raise the strain Of triumphant gladness! God has brought His Israel Into joy from sadness, Loosed from Pharoah's bitter yoke Jacob's sons and daughters, Let them with unmoistened foot Through the Red Sea waters.

'This the spring of souls today: Christ has burst His prison
And from three days' sleep in death As a sun has risen;
All the winter of our sins, Long and dark, is flying
From His light, to whom is giv'n Laud and praise undying.

Now the queen of seasons, bright With the day of splendor, With the royal feast of feasts Comes its joy to render; Comes to gladden faithful hearts Which with true affection Welcome in unwearied strain Jesus' resurrection!

For today among His own Christ appeared, bestowing His deep peace, which evermore Passes human knowing. Neither could the gates of death Nor the tomb's dark portal Nor the watchers nor the seal Hold Him as a mortal.

Alleluia! Now we cry To our King immortal, Who, triumphant, burst the bars Of the tomb's dark portal. Come, you faithful, raise the strain Of triumphant gladness! God has brought His Israel Into joy from sadness! This hymn, by one of the fathers of the Greek church of the eighth century, the greatest of her hymn writers, John of Damascus, is based on the first ode of the canon for St. Thomas Sunday (the first Sunday after Easter). It is based on the song of Moses in Exodus 15. A look at stanza 1 points to and relates the deliverance effected by Moses with that effected by Christ and His resurrection, as in stanza 2.

John of Damascus (c. 675 or 696 - c. 749 - 754), one of the great early theologians and poets, perhaps the greatest of the Greek church, was born in Damascus toward the close of the 7th century. Here, he and his adopted brother, Cosmas the Melodist, were educated by a captive Italian Monk. After succeeding his father as chief representative of the Christians to the Mohammedan caliph, he and Cosmas gave away their possessions and retired to the monastery of St. Sabas which was between the Dead Sea and Jerusalem. There, John was ordained a priest by the Church of Jerusalem and spent his life writing theological works in defense of the Orthodox faith. He also composed many other hymns. He wrote several for the then newly developed canons, some of these for the Greek festivals of the church. The best known of his canons is the Easter 1 or Golden canon. He also wrote another one in our hymnal: The Day of Resurrection. He wrote Octechos, a book of chants.

The tune is *Gaudeamus Periter* which is considered a traditional German tune, author unknown.

Updates to Devices



Automatic or manual updates? Do all of your devices operate on the same level? Is there anything you have to do even when you have set automatic updates in your device preferences? Do you automatically think you have done something wrong when your device worked fine yesterday and today you are having problems? All of these questions have "yes and no" answers.

For example, you own a computer that runs Windows 10, an older tablet that runs Android 6.0 and a Samsung Galaxy S7 that runs Android 7.0 but each have the latest updates to their respective system. Each is set for automatic updates (preference) and yet often there is some manual assistance needed.

Your computer may be set for automatic updates during the early hours of the morning (if you leave your computer on all the time) and for the most part works like a charm. However, once in a while you may have to do a manual restart. So, if you are having some problems, reboot your computer and that may take care of it. Looking at the updates setting on your computer may give you a clue if it is simply waiting for a reboot to complete the update. When in doubt, reboot! Even if you leave your computer on all the time a frequent reboot, perhaps even daily, may head off hours of trying to figure out what you did wrong.

Your tablet or smartphone may finish their update when next you turn it on, or it may tell you that there is an update available and do you want to run it or have it remind you later. If you are in a hurry, opt for later, but generally the update only takes a very few minutes and you can do it while you do some other task.

Should you always update? Generally yes, but occasionally there can be a feature that does not work. Don't assume it is your fault. Recently an update to Windows 10 caused Outlook to not function. A call to my friendly IT expert told me that this error had just been announced. He said to go to the update section and uninstall the latest update. Then click on the update that came right after that to install it. Problem fixed!

Devices running at different levels can still communicate and sync for the most part. There does come a time, however, when operating systems are no longer supported and will not communicate with newer technology. Check with an expert if you are having significant problems. It may be time to upgrade not just update.

A recent question that should probably be shared: should you fully discharge the battery on your device before charging? Prior to 2000 the answer would have been yes. Devices after 2000 have batteries that generally derive no benefit from letting them discharge as older batteries did. Let's say your phone is at 75% of battery and you know you are going to be gone all afternoon and will be need your phone available. While you are getting ready, charge your phone or use your car charger while driving. The same 75% of battery may last you all afternoon while at home so your nighttime charge will suffice.

Make sure you check your device's manual (you may have to get this online) regarding charging. Use a smart charger on your newer devices as they sense when your device battery is charged and don't continue charging. Older chargers did not do this.

Remember these comments are not tech answers for each and every device but generalities from research and various discussions. Make sure you investigate what is right for your devices.

A godly use of technology also means being aware of your technology to some extent and how to care for it, or at least having somebody that can give you good advice.

UPDATE ON CHURCH RENTAL PROPERTIES

The church has three properties being leased:

PROPERTY ONE

Head Start, also referred to as E Center, is leasing the front school building. They have a five-year lease starting 2016 and are limited to 67 students. The current rent is \$3,400.00 per month. Head Start, at their own expense, is constructing a professionally designed play ground in the area between their building and the Parish Hall. Redeemer has approved the playground and the playground will remain the property of Redeemer when Head Start leaves the facility.

PROPERTY TWO

THRIVE is leasing the back school building. They have a five-year lease starting in 2016 and are limited to 93 students. The current rent is \$3,550.00 per month. THRIVE offers curriculum to home school families and other children that need academic help in subjects that they may not be familiar with. Recently they have asked for another five-year lease and a first right of refusal if and when Head Start cancels their lease.

The net income from property one and two is distributed as follows:

- •35% to the Mission Trust Fund
- •30% to the Scholarship Trust Fund
- •20% to the Church Facilities Reserve Fund
- •10% to the School Facilities Reserve Fund
- •5% to the Musician and Concert Fund

PROPERTY THREE

The parsonage was vacant the months of February and March and as of April 1, 2018 it is leased to the Fred Sherman III family for use by their son Fred Sherman IV and two other roommates. The current rent is \$1,500.00. The net income from the parsonage goes directly to our Pastor according to provisions approved by the Voter's Assembly.

NOTE: The Board of Trustees are responsible for overseeing the rental of all three properties. However, properties one and two are managed day to day by a hired real estate firm. The property manager for the real estate firm is paid a 5% commission. The parsonage is managed by one of the trustees.

From childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. (2 Timothy 3:15)



The above scripture while true indeed, is not one that is generally foundational in our culture today. Many times references made to a Bible story will cause a deer-in-theheadlight look on the face of a

younger person. Why? This is a good discussion topic, but for the purposes here we will simply say that it is because books of Bible stories have not been a foundational part of a child's library.

Concordia Publishing has a variety of books with Bible stories. The three listed here are ones that while not from the same author, follow the same basic format. They have stories from the Old and New Testament and are written for age appropriateness. These have all been treasured books for many years that have been updated.



My First Bible Storybook has 72 stories from both Old and New Testament and is recommended for ages 2-4; however, it could be used earlier than that depending on the child. It is available in hardback from both CPH and Amazon.



A Child's Garden of Bible Stories is recommended for ages 6-8 though could certainly be started earlier. 6-8 year olds, however, would be able to read the stories themselves. As a matter of fact, this book was used as a

textbook in 2nd grade in many Lutheran schools in years past.

There are 60 stories from both Old and New Testament. It is available from both Concordia

Publishing House and Amazon. Amazon does show a paperback (used) in their listing.


There are also workbooks (one each for Old and New Testament) that go along with this book and have references to the page of the story in the book. The benefit of these worksheets is that they involve family or adult input for discussion, so they are not just coloring sheets.

120 Bible Stories follows next and is recommended for ages 8-12. There are 120 Bible stories from Old and New Testament plus much more.

These stories use the English Standard Version so your children will be hearing the same language of scripture that they hear in church though there may be more paragraph breaks to facilitate their reading. Along with the story there are reflection questions, words to remember (beginning memorization) some pages of explanation with charts and some maps. There are also some sections from the Small Catechism, for example, parts of the Apostle's Creed and there is also a glossary. This book would also be recommended for early teens not previously exposed to the Bible. All in all, an amazing reference tool for your students and perhaps for parents too!

Using these tools can serve as a good guide or template for you as parents to tell/read other Bible stories not included in these books. Thus you will help build a solid foundation of biblical knowledge for your children so that Bible references will no longer fly over their heads. When somebody says "that was a David and Goliath encounter" they will have a mental reference key to unlock the conversation.

Why not consider using one of these Bible storybooks for your family devotional time. Help your children "treasure the Word of God" in their hearts.

Pentecost

From Pentecost through the following Saturday

The Theme

The season of Pentecost is actually not a "season," but an octave, or week-long celebration of the Feast of Pentecost. Most congregations participate in the feast only on the Sunday of Pentecost itself, but where there is opportunity to do so, there should be a celebration each day of the week following.

This feast closes the festival half of the church year. It is often called "The birthday of the church," although the church has existed from the creation. The event commemorated is the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the church, giving a new meaning to the Old Testament feast celebrated that day. Christ had promised that He would send the Spirit after He ascended into heaven, so that His work would continue after He withdrew His visible presence.

The work of the Holy Spirit is that of building the church. He does this through the means of grace, the word and sacrament. He does not call attention to Himself, but always points to Christ and His work. The Nicene Creed succinctly lists the things that the Holy Spirit does: He is the giver of life; He speaks by the prophets; He creates the one holy catholic and apostolic church; He is poured out on a person when he is baptized; He gives forgiveness of sins; He will resurrect the bodies of all people; He will give eternal life to those who believe in Christ.

Luther's Small Catechism explains this work, under the third article of the Apostle's Creed:

I believe that I cannot, by my own reason or strength, believe in Jesus Christ, or come to Him, but the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the one true faith; even as He calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith; in which Christian church He daily and richly forgives all sins to me and to all believers, and will at the last day raise up me and all the dead, and give to me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true!

The Mood

The mood of this feast is joyful, as people rejoice at a wedding, or at a bountiful harvest. The Old Testament people brought their "first fruits" of their crops to the temple on this day. It was a joyful harvest festival. We, the new Israel bring our selves as a living sacrifice to God. We rejoice in His manifold blessing.

The Holy Spirit empowers us to follow Christ's command to go and preach the Gospel in all the world. "You shall be My witnesses, in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8). This was emphasized by the disciple's speaking the good news to those who came from various countries in the language of their homeland.

The Color

The color of this feast is a glorious, joyful red. It signifies the appearance of what looked like tongues of fire over the heads of the disciples on that first Christian Pentecost.


