

HOLY WEEK

Last year we did not hold services for ten weeks, under the state restrictions imposed upon our church. This time included most of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter time. The command of God is clear and I succumbed to the pressure of the government, thereby sinning against God by not offering the essential means of grace to the flock. The devil, world, and my sinful flesh overcame me in my cowardice and fear. I thank God for his forgiveness of my sin and through the Gospel and sacraments He has

forgiven me. I also ask for your forgiveness, as I did not fulfill the duties of my call to be your pastor, and to serve you faithfully under all circumstances. This is my confession to you and I pray your forgiveness.

Now, we have opportunities before us as God allows during this Time of Easter, which began on Ash Wednesday and extends through the Day of Pentecost. During this special time of Lent we are meditating, praying, and hearing of the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, and all that he did and said for our salvation.

Holy Week, the week before Easter, begins on Palm Sunday and ends with midday prayer on Holy Saturday. Our Lenten preparation and repentance deepen as we focus on the events of Jesus' life from his entrance into Jerusalem until his death on the cross and burial in the garden tomb.

Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week, commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (Matthew 21). Because the complete account of the Lord's Passion from Matthew, Mark, or Luke is often read, this Sunday is called the Sunday of the Passion.

On Holy (Maundy) Thursday, the church gives thanks to Jesus for the institution of His Supper. This is a Feast Day. The Holy Thursday service

closes with the stripping of the altar. This reminds us of how our Lord was stripped to the waist to wash His disciples' feet – and how He was stripped and beaten before His crucifixion.

Good Friday is the most solemn of all the days in the Christian Church; yet a note of joy remains, as the title of the day indicates. On Good Friday, as we remember that because of our sin the Lord was crucified and died, we give joyful thanks to God that all sin and God's wrath over sin falls on Jesus and not on

us, and that by His grace we receive the benefit of this most sacrificial act.

During Holy Week, we worship our Lord, who gives His life for us, according to Matthew 26-27, Mark 14-15, Luke 22-23, and John 18-19.

In many churches the color for Holy Week continues to be purple.

Many congregations read the Passion narrative during special midweek services of Lent. But on each day of Holy Week, the whole story of the event leading to Jesus' death and burial is read from a single Gospel.

While in Lent, we forgo using the joyous Alleluia response, and we do not sing the Gloria in Excelsis. In Holy Week, we go a step further as we give up singing the Gloria Patri – our joyful response to the Holy Trinity at the end of all the Psalms we use in worship. Omitting these joyous words makes our worship even more reserved and somber.

Holy Week is a special time as we gather for several services throughout the week.

Come, receive the gifts of Jesus as we assemble in the church to hear His Word, pray, praise, and give thanks.

Technology caution...

Have you noticed lately that you are getting more and more phone calls and email that might be questionable even if it appears to be from a friend, relative or a business entity? Do you automatically answer the call or click on the email? You might want to consider your automatic responses.

If it is a phone call it is easy to disconnect from the call as soon as you realize it is not your friend. What about if it is from a business service you use? If you are being asked questions requesting personal information, hang up. Do not ever give out information to an unsolicited phone caller (even if the caller says they are calling on behalf of a friend or family member). If, for example, the caller says they are from PG&E or another service you use and they need to update your personal information on file (a frequent scam) hang up immediately. Then call directly to PG&E or other service and inquire if they are trying to contact you regarding updating information because you received a call asking for information.

Today telephone scammers are posing as calling from your bank, your credit card company, public utilities, your medical facility, your church, social security, IRS, even the police department, etc. And remember, do not ask the caller for "the company number" so you can verify this request as you will just be given the scammer's number who will then request personal information. Get the customer service number from your latest statement or the back of your credit card.

Not too long ago it was fairly easy to recognize an email scam or spam. The attempt at replicating the legitimate company's logo was amateurish; the text of the email often had misspelled words or questionable grammar but not so today. Today's email scam is very often highly sophisticated and even the logo looks legitimate and the link you are asked to click on looks convincing. Again, don't click on any link that you have not requested.

Most legitimate businesses take spam very seriously. If you get an email from your bank or other company that you have not requested DO NOT CLICK ON IT. Go directly to the company website and see if you can find their "fraud, spam, phishing" contact link or at least their customer service contact info. Frequently they will have a list that comes up asking for your query information. Click on spam or some variation of that and then an information notice may come up telling you what to do and where to forward the suspicious email. If this is not available, just delete the email remembering to not open it or click on any link in the email.

A hot topic right now is COVID-19. There are all kinds of scams, spam, and fraudulent pleas circulating right now. The common thread is asking for gift cards to help victims or families of victims cope with their losses. You are asked to give out bank information or purchase these cards directly through an email or a phone call. Do not do this.

HELPFUL HINT: There are many who use their debit card for just about everything. However, did you know that if you use a credit card and you were caught by one of these scams you probably can get all charges reversed? Make sure to check with your credit card company and your bank on your liability regarding this issue.

HELPFUL HINT #2: Set up an alert for your credit cards so that you see right away when a charge has been made and if it was not legitimate you can contact them immediately. These alerts can be set for text or email, or both, and can be set for any amount you choose, even as little as \$1.00.

One more thing...if you find some information that you think a friend would like and you are not in the habit of sharing information from the internet, send them an email or call them and tell them that you are sending them a link. You might even arrange to have a "code word" in the subject line that verifies it is from you.

While we all agree that technology is a wonderful thing, there are too many who are using it for harm or with evil intent. Be vigilant, trustworthy, careful and... WHEN IN DOUBT, DON'T!

And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. (Deut 6: 6-7 ESV)

What's your favorite musical style to listen to? Who is one of your favorite composers? Do you listen to primarily one style of music or do you match your music selections to your mood?

However you answered the above questions probably has its roots in what you heard as a child and what was taught to you as a child as well as the kind and style of music that was played in your home. Did you ever talk about music and composers in your home?

What music is played in your home that you are teaching your children? Whether you realize it or not the music in your home or in your car as you drive influences your children. How can you be deliberate about musical selections?

Even if you have no specific music training you can recognize various types of music and teach these to your children. Remember going to 4th of July picnics where there might have been a bandstand in the park. Very probably some of the music played was from John Phillip Souza and people tapped their toes and may have even gotten up and marched around or even danced.

Start with some easily identifiable styles of music. Say for instance *Onward Christian Soldiers*. Play this for your children (without lyrics if possible) and ask them what their body wants to do then let them move that way. More than likely they will get up and march around perhaps even swinging their arms. Then play something like *Beautiful Savior* and ask them to move to the music.

While both of the above mentioned hymns are in 4/4 time, meaning 4 beats to each measure, the feel of the music is very different. Now play those selections again but this time with lyrics and ask your children how each song made them feel. Now play a lullaby such as *All Through the Night* and see what response you elicit. Again in 4/4 time but very different physical responses naturally happen.

Over the next few weeks in church pay particular attention to the hymns, lyrics as well as music. Pick

one or two that particularly made you respond in whatever way. Then ask the rest of the family which hymn they liked best (probably a more appropriate question for children) and why? Was it the lyrics (words) or the feel of the music? Was it the way the organist made the organ sound? Keep notes on the responses from the family.

If you are able after a few weeks contact your church organist and ask if you could have a few minutes of time to talk about how he or she decides how to play certain hymns. Make sure to pick ones that you and your family have identified. Tell the organist that you are trying to be deliberate in teaching your children about how music affects our responses and our moods, etc. Remember the organist is not there to just fill in the time before and after the service, but is an integral part of the worship of the congregation.



What you sing about influences what you believe. . .



Music is not neutral. It is a medium that evokes images, feelings, and an idea. But even when music is not the issue, the words are. You cannot sing words that detract from the faith without those words detracting from YOUR faith. You cannot sing words that speak of the symbolism of baptism without affirming its sacramental gift without your understanding of baptism changing, shifting away from what God does to what you did. You cannot sing words that speak of bread and wine and very special little meal between you and Jesus without eroding your faith in Christ's real presence and it becomes only a special meal of bread and wine. That is simply how it works.

Rome is only beginning to wake up to the damage done by the hymns of recent years long on imagery but light on theology. Some Lutherans have woken up but others refuse to believe that it matters what you sing as long as you love singing it. This is especially egregious since hymns are kind of a Lutheran thing. We sort of re-invented hymnody and congregational song and without it

the Reformation may not have actually happened. The Gospel was literally sung into the hearts and minds of the faithful until that was the only thing they would settle for. When that Gospel and orthodox doctrine are no longer being sung into the hearts and minds of the faithful, something else is. And that is a problem.

No pastor wants to know the favorite hymns of the folks in the pews. Inevitably you will have somebody or more than one somebody insisting that *In the Garden* is not only their most favoritist hymn of all but the best one every written and it just sends goosebumps up their spine and puts tears in their eyes every time they sing it. The problem is that *In the Garden* probably fits a lot of their theology -- me'n'Jesus against the world, Jesus loves y'all but He loves me bestest, and nature is the place where God speaks to me more than anywhere else. Folks don't even think about what they are singing. Or maybe they do.

Even pastors have crazy hymn favorites. I have been at pastors' funerals where we sang terrible hymns because the pastors said that is what they wanted. They were not in our hymnals and did not express the faith we confess and these pastors promised to confess at confirmation and ordination, but so what? They are only hymns, right? They really do not matter. It is all up to personal preference -- what we like to sing, what speaks to our inner soul, and what makes us feel better.

Well, I am just going to say it. If we confess it in words (creed and Confessions) then we ought to be singing it in hymns. If the Scriptures teach it, then we ought to be singing it in the Church's song. Because the more we sing it, the more we believe it -- while that is true of bad theology, it is equally true of good theology! Hymns that confess have a salutary catechetical function and one that accords well with the other places where the faith is taught, learned, confessed, and witnessed. We ignore this to our peril.

Just like folks who listen to contemporary Christian music all day long will see their *catholic and apostolic* theology diluted and distorted by evangelicalism's focus on feelings, earthly goals, and worldly oriented pursuits, so will folks who listen to, memorize, and pray the great hymns of the faith (especially the Lutheran chorale) will find their *catholic and apostolic* theology strengthened, affirmed, and supported. This makes the biggest difference when trouble, trial, sorrow, and struggle come along and the Christian must rely upon the firm foundation of Christ crucified and risen for their salvation. When you have these hymns within you, they serve as a compass and anchor amid life's storms and changes.

When I was in Seminary I would visit a blind Lutheran lady in the nursing home. All she wanted of me was to read the hymn stanzas from *The Lutheran Hymnal*. After a few times I looked up and saw her lips moving. She was repeating them as I read them, building up her memory, strengthening her faith, and edifying her soul. Now remember, this was *TLH*, a hymnal that sometimes included 25 or 50 stanzas and not modern day hymnals written for the faint of heart, with 10 or less stanzas. She had already memorized them and since she could not read them, my reading of them into her ears supported their place within her heart and mind. This cannot happen with vague hymns written for emotional highs or praise choruses that say nothing a dozen times in a row or hymns that speak about everything but that which has a reference in Scripture.

Lex ordandi lex credendi applies to hymns as well. What you sing about influences what you believe. Not every hymn in *Lutheran Service Book* is equally weighty but every one of them is better than what most people have as their playlist from contemporary Christian music. In our Lutheran service books, a bad hymn is rare but in the CCM playlist, a good hymn is exceptional.

"HERE I STAND"

The 500th Anniversary of Luther's Confession at the Diet of Worms **Sunday, April 18**

HERE I STAND SUNDAY IT'S STILL ALL ABOUT Jesus

Luther's Answer at the Diet of Worms:

It could have all ended the evening of April 18, 1521. The sun was beginning to set on the city of Worms. The heat was stifling in the packed room of the bishop's palace where emperor, electors and German princes all waited with anticipation to hear the answer Martin Luther would bring. Would Luther recant? Would he retract what he had written and said against abuses in the church and against papal tyranny? Most of all, would he give up on the Gospel he had preached and taught, giving comfort and certainty to consciences in Christ?

"Martin, answer clearly and without any double-talk: Do you or do you not recant your books and the errors in them?" If Luther were to recant and admit that he was wrong, all would be well before the emperor and the Roman Catholic Church. On the other hand, if he did not recant, his own life would be at risk. He could be burned as a heretic.

This was it: recant or stand firm. With beads of sweat on his face, Luther responded:

"Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason (for I do not trust either in the pope or in councils alone, since it is well known that they have often erred and contradicted themselves), I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe

nor right to go against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand, may God help me, Amen" (LW 32:112–13).

At this bold confession, the room erupted in noise. Some rejoiced; some demanded fire! Yet, in the midst of such commotion, the truth of Jesus Christ rang forth. The gates of Hades had not prevailed over the confession of the Gospel. The proclamation of justification by grace through faith on account of Christ's work alone did not bend to spiritual tyranny.

500 Years Later:

Today, we stand in the footsteps of Martin Luther 500 years later. We stand boldly, proclaiming the One who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous light. We stand boldly, renouncing the devil and all his works and all his ways. We stand, by the grace of God, steadfast and ready to suffer all rather than fall away. We do not stand on Luther, but we will gladly stand with him, firm on the testimony of the Holy Scriptures to confess the saving Gospel of Christ, our Good Shepherd, who died and rose, in whose name is forgiveness of sins for all people. Here we stand; we can do no other. God help us. Amen.
