

EASTER IS IN GOD'S CONTROL, NOT YOURS

We are living now in the time of Easter and its season, which began on Holy Saturday and ends with the midday prayer on Pentecost.

Easter is not merely a one-day celebration. It is a fifty-day season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season – one seventh of the year – is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.



Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Flowers and lilies adorn the chancel. There is a festive processional hymn and a gospel procession. The trumpets blare and the congregation proclaims "He is risen. He is risen, indeed."

While not as lavish, this joyous and celebratory tone echoes through the Sundays of the Easter season.

Forty days after Easter, the Church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by the early Christians to commemorate the first great



harvest of believers for Christ. Thus, Pentecost is the day the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and they gave their bold and compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. The color for the Day of Pentecost is red, representing fire and blood. Red recalls the tongues of fire received on the first Pentecost and the martyrs who shed their blood for the faith.

During Easter, we rejoice in our salvation that Scripture

records in Matthew 28, Luke 24, John 12:24-25; 20:1-29; 21:1-14 and Acts 1:6-11; 2:1-4.

The color of Easter is white. White is the color of our Lord's holiness, which is everywhere during Easter, from the paraments and vestments of the pastor to the traditional Easter lilies.

After a long absence in Lent, "Alleluia" returns at Easter and is heard everywhere in the propers appointed for the weeks after Easter. The joyous hymn of praise, "This is the Feast," is sung with gusto and vigor as the resurrection of Jesus is extolled.

God is in control of His work, despite the notion that sometimes we think we are in control. He does his work and continues that work in the church today. The resurrection of Easter does not depend on you or me. The joy of Christ is given to you and me by the Holy Spirit.

The joy of the resurrection be with you in body and soul.

When was the last time you received a handwritten note and not an email? This might have even been from a friend with whom you have an active email correspondence but this time they actually put pen to paper and wrote you a note. How did you feel when you opened the note? Did you linger over the note a bit? Were you tempted to simply dash off an email response or is the note still sitting on your desk waiting for you to handwrite a response? Why do you want to respond in writing rather than an email? Ponder these thoughts for a few minutes.

What are some of the benefits of email versus sending correspondence through mail?

- Rapid delivery
- No needing to buy stamps and then find a post box for mailing
- Received email text can be enlarged so ease of reading
- If vision has become a problem you can set your computer/tablet to read the text to you
- Add your own thoughts to this list

If you were born before computers you probably remember your teacher saying in response to the "why do we have to write these words over and over" that the fact of writing causes your brain to receive impulses from your hand and arm and this helps you to remember (or some variation of this). Why was discipline over some issue often to write 25, 50 of 100 times "I will not…" Why did your music teacher assign scales for daily practice? All of these include muscle memory.

To add to your pondering consider taking notes by hand versus typing into your laptop. When you type is this more of an automatic action and the words almost bypass your thinking process whereas when you write you are going slower so that you can actually read your notes later on.

Again, if you are of a certain age, remember where taking at least a year of typing in high school was considered essential. The goal was to not only be able to copy (type) from a written text until you could reach

a certain speed, but the teacher also dictated material so that you were able to reach proficiency to a certain level. (Some of you learned shorthand but that is another skill not learned by the majority.)

Why bring this up at all? Isn't technology for writing better than longhand? Think about that for a time. Have we become so "conditioned" to using our computers and tablets that we may be missing out on some of the benefits of sitting down and writing? Obviously there are many benefits of using a computer when writing a research paper or other such texts where revisions may need to be made. And having to prepare a multi-column spread sheet is hands down better using a computer.

The take away from these thoughts is that perhaps we need to slow down from time to time, think about that family member or friend and actually put pen to paper and write them a note and mail it. Not just a birthday card with a short note though that is good, but an actual letter.

Technology has great benefits and if your day requires extensive correspondence there is no replacing your computer. However, technology needs to be used in a godly manner and perhaps in some cases that means not using it. Think on these things and whether or not there is somebody in your life who would greatly benefit from a handwritten note.

SOLAR INSTALLATION APPROVED!



Board of Trustees have approved a solar installation. Alternative Energy Systems was selected, with an estimated cost of \$44,789.92. Memorial and Facility accounts will be used to fund the project. The savings in electrical use is anticipated at about \$400 a month. Look for installation to begin shortly when the panels are placed on the Parish Hall roof.

WHAT TO EXPECT AS A TRAVELING LUTHERAN

I had the opportunity to travel during Lent this year with a Lutheran friend of mine. As someone who appreciates routine, living out of a Suburban made Lent difficult but not impossible. We had lots of opportunities to attend Lenten services as we traveled and I have some advice to Lutherans looking to travel: Do your research before you go!

Pastor Jordan often admonishes the use of screens during services, which for me was confusing but I took him at his word and my experience this year proved him absolutely right. On our second day road tripping we found a local LCMS church for Ash Wednesday. Screens aside, it seemed people standing outside didn't even know they regularly attended a church that was listed as an LCMS, which was a red flag alone. The second warning was they had removed all LSBs from the pews. Giving them the benefit of doubt because of our current issues with COVID-19, we stayed for the service. Inside, we were treated to a confession and absolution via screens that completely replaced Jesus with requiring forgiveness for absolution of our racism and climate change denial. Another church with screens began accidentally absolving themselves in which the pastor had to interrupt them saying "No, this is my part of the liturgy." Using the LSB for liturgy would have prevented this. Pastor Jordan is right; "Screens are disastrous for liturgical services because they allow the church leadership to bypass Lutheran doctrine and replace it with their own, which is dangerous because even though they may be an LCMS church, they may not have confessional pastors. The LSB is there for OUR benefit! It's important that LCMS

parishioners encourage their use."

A great example for why we need confessional Lutheran pastors was when one church had a Baptist youth leader. He ran the youth program, which is good that they have one, but could not catechize the children because he wasn't catechized himself. I had asked him if he had planned on getting catechized and I didn't really get a response from him on this. He did say, however, that the pastor was responsible for catechesis so even though he wasn't catechizing them, the pastor was.

The best experiences I had while traveling were at churches I already knew were confessional Lutheran churches. When I knew where I would be on Sundays, I would do research beforehand and have Pastor Jordan assist me with referrals. Doing a little bit of foot work, I was able to know what I could expect from those churches. I could show up and participate without skipping a beat. The best thing about being a new Lutheran was that I still got to experience interesting differences in the way services were conducted compared to ours, especially with regards to music. I got to experience different Introit tunes, as well as the inclusion of a choir. I enjoyed the unique architecture of each church, also.

"Till we all come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ; that we should no longer be children, tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, in the cunning craftiness of deceitful plotting, but, speaking the truth in love, may grow up in all things into Him who is the head — Christ—" - Ephesians 4:13-15 (NKJV)
