GOD IS NOT FAIR, AND NEITHER IS LIFE

How often have you observed and believed that life is not fair? There are rich and poor, educated and uneducated, sick and healthy, married and divorced, some loved ones taken in death and others left to live. Some are selected for the job opening and others are rejected. Some are tall and some are short. It is true. Life is not fair. That's a fact.

Furthermore, God is not fair according to our standards, but the problem is that God does not

need to follow and observe our standards of fairness and equity.

God has always had a mysterious way of reversing things as He deals with people. He exalts the lowly and puts down the mighty and proud. He indicates that the first shall be last and the last shall be first. This is a mystery to us and confounds our thinking, because God does not operate on a merit-based system of rewards and performance.

In Matthew 20 we learn about the parable of the vineyard workers. God is the master of the vineyard and he calls laborers to work for him early in the morning. He indicates he will pay them a day's wages, the denarius, which is equal to one day's pay for a soldier.

The master then hires other workers throughout the and simply tells them that he will pay them what is right.

Working in the kingdom of God is a privilege and a labor of love that is initiated and carried out by our heavenly Father in the kingdom of His Son, Jesus



Christ. Some workers start early in the day and others start later, but the pay is the same.

Somehow, this doesn't seem fair to us. Shouldn't those who worked all day be paid more? No. They received their agreed upon wage. Shouldn't those who worked for only a few hours be paid less? No. Because God the Father indicated he would pay all fairly and equitably, not based on the hours worked or intensity of the labor. Peter and other disciples didn't get this. They

believed that had given their all and that they deserved more for their efforts.

God doesn't need you to carry out his work and God certainly doesn't depend on you. His love, care and grace has called you into his kingdom, into his vineyard to work and labor for Him by spreading the Gospel and serving others in His name.

You and I need God and all that he provides us in body and soul. We need his care each day to survive. We need his forgiveness of sins through Christ our Lord. We depend upon God for our very lives and for our eternal salvation through the life, death, and resurrection of his Son. We depend upon what God gives us in the holy sacraments.

Only by grace, not by works or merit, are you included in God's kingdom, his vineyard. All are equal recipients of the gifts of God in the Gospel.

God is generous. He does not give us what we deserve, but he gives us what we don't deserve. Thanks be to God in Christ, our Lord.

FEEDBACK FROM A LISTENER

"Hello, Pastor Jordan

I started a new, part-time job driving from Redding to Chico from 12:30 - 4:30 and I heard your sermon on the radio and you said to call if this has blessed you.

And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. (Deut 6: 6-7 ESV)

Our last article talked about using summer to implement a cooking/baking program with your children. It was suggested they contact family and/or friends to ask for their favorite recipes. Also we talked about the possibility of growing some of the ingredients, especially herbs, in your yard whether directly in the ground or in pots and then drying some of the herbs or storing in the freezer.

Hopefully there was enough interest generated by this activity to continue it throughout the year. Now schoolwork may not allow as much time for each child to have at least one meal per week to cook; however, check to see where you can incorporate school assignments into the kitchen. Remember we said that cooking teaches math, time management, organizational skills, research, etc.

Looking ahead, perhaps some of the new skills learned can be incorporated into holiday gifts for family and friends especially if they contributed a recipe or two. Perhaps you can take some of the dried herbs (did you have to do some research on how to do this?) and put them into small individual jars decorated with a uniquely designed label (could this be an art project?) and give these as gifts.

Remember time management skills? This is a great lesson in planning ahead for gift giving. What about making a booklet or a video showing the finished product of not only recipes but things that were grown in your garden? These could be personalized for each individual by taking a picture of the specific recipe you received from them being enjoyed by your family.

Another skill: working not only individually but as a team. Add specifics about what each member of the family contributed. For example, mom taught how to properly use various tools in the kitchen, dad helped prepare a place in the garden and taught what needed to be done, older brother or sister helped research various things on the computer or helped design labels or maybe took photos to go into your booklet.

What about statistics or at least data tracking? Not often thought about in learning to cook, but if you

think about it you can track who in the family liked or disliked each new recipe. Analyzing may bring out such things as one family member doesn't like anything that has tomatoes while another wants parsley in just about everything. As a "chef" this is good information to know. Also, keeping track of what you serve to various guests can keep you from always having spaghetti when they are invited to dinner and not realizing that they really don't care for spaghetti.

Hopefully you are starting to look at teaching your children to cook/bake with a different perspective. Maybe it has even caused you to rethink some of what you yourself do in the kitchen.

One last question: what did you learn about foods eaten by people in the Bible that are the same or different from what you eat? That information could also go into your booklet or video about your summer cooking project!



Technology not required

This information comes from a Huntington Beach, CA police detective many, many years ago. He spoke about protecting identity especially after the death of a spouse but this particular tip applies to all whether single, married or widowed and does not require a technology device.

Many of you pay everything online, with your smart phone or a credit/debit card. There is great convenience to that; however, for those of you who still primarily write checks this little tip adds a layer of safety.

Next time you reorder your checks do not have your full name printed on your checks. Instead only use your initials and last name. For example, J. A. Sutter could be John Alexander, James Aubrey, Jessica Anne, Joan Abigail etc. By not having your first, middle and last name printed on your check your signature becomes less obvious. Do you sign J. Alexander Sutter, J.A. Sutter, John A. Sutter, etc?

If you have special circumstances attached to your checking account contact your bank before making this change. And if in doubt about not having your full name on your checks ask your bank. Remember this tip was made many years ago when identity theft was rearing its ugly head. Your bank may have even more up-to-date recommendations for those of you who prefer to not use technology in all its forms.


THREE MASTER'S DEGREES – THREE CAREERS

(Master of Library and Information Science) also from UCLA, and an M.E.A. (Master of Educational Administration) from CSU Los Angeles. (I Corinthians 15:57) Through your prayers and support God is raising kingdom workers throughout Mexico.

Ana and Kathy made a trip to the states during the first week of July, so that Ana could get her COVID vaccine. Unfortunately, it was impossible for Ana to get her vaccine in Mexico because she does not have a resident visa. During this time Kathy was also able to get together with her brother and sister for the first time since their mother and father's passing away. It was a very meaningful event for the whole family.

Here in Mexico, we have experienced a resurgence of the number of COVID cases. At this point of time less than half of the Mexican population has been vaccinated. Accordingly, the three of us continue to exercise due caution when we go out in public. The businesses continue to require a mask and a person takes your temperature with an electronic device when you enter the establishment.

The Lutheran Churches in Mexico City continue to hold worship services in the sanctuaries. In these worship services the members maintain distance and communion is distributed with gloved hands. The national pastors continue to record the worship services on Facebook for those who cannot attend the services in the sanctuaries.

Pastor Isaac Garcia is now hosting weekly catechism classes via ZOOM for a group of people who comprise our new mission start in the state of Sonora, Mexico. Please keep this group in your prayers as they form a new Lutheran congregation in this region of Mexico.

Vicar Job Jimenez and his wife Diana Eliza recently celebrated the birth of their first child, Noah. We give thanks to God for this new member of God's family. Vicar Job serves at our mission congregation in Tijuana. The ministry in Tijuana presents many challenges; drug addiction and crime are very rampant. At the same time there exists a great need for the Gospel of Christ. Accordingly, our mission congregation in Tijuana continues to proclaim this Gospel and serves as a beacon of hope to many people.

Enclosed please find our prayer card a photo of a baptism service that took place at the mission congregation Cristo Rey in Tapachula, México. National pastor Isaac Garcia is presiding. Your donations provide ongoing theological education and materials for pastor Isaac. Thank you again for your support and prayers!

LUTHERANISM 101: A LAYMAN'S VIEWPOINT



As some of you may know Pastor Jordan catechized new members of the church this summer. Despite being catechized and confirmed two years ago, I decided to join the class to continue learning about what it means to be a confessional Lutheran. If you read my article in June's

newsletter, I talked about why I chose to attend a confessional Lutheran church after years of being involved in mainstream Evangelical churches. I've also been attending a men's Bible study from a local non-denominational church and it reminded me of how different our confession is to other Protestant denominations. All of this made me think about delving deeper into what Lutheranism is and the best way for me to do this is to explain to others my own Lutheran confession.

Because there are so many doctrinal topics to cover that set confessional Lutherans apart from other Protestants, I've decided to cover them one at a time over the rest of the year. I do not have an organized outline but I plan on covering the following topics:

- •The biblical history of Communion. Why it's important to have it and why closed communion shows respect not only for the sacrament itself but also to those who partake in it.
- •Why Lutherans urge baptism soon after birth (infant baptism) and why we believe that baptism saves.
- •The importance of the Office of the Keys and why Lutherans should defend this doctrine when it is attacked by other protestants.

I've found that the last bullet point I mentioned seems to be the most touchy to other Protestants because in their minds, the public absolution of sin is "Catholic" and anything "Catholic" belongs on a trash heap along with purgatory, Mary worship and the rest. In fact, when discussing the Office of the Keys with other Christians, I often find as much resistance as when I share the gospel with an aggressive atheist!

Why is this? I think many Protestants, and especially Lutherans because we are very "Catholic" in

nature, shy away from the word 'catholic'. I can remember times where I believed Roman Catholics weren't even Christians. As I began to learn about Luther, the Catholic Church and early church traditions, I realized that apart from theology that contradicts the gospel or the Bible there is no reason to get rid of catholic label. Marking yourself with the sign of the cross, the Pastor's collar and vestments - even the word catholic itself - none of this is bad. By the way, we really do belong to the Holy **Catholic** and Apostolic church! As Lutherans, we should embrace our catholic traditions. We are the true Catholic church.

I hope you enjoy this journey with me this summer as I explore exactly what it means to me to be a Lutheran and hopefully we learn something new together.

TRUSTEE UPDATE

The Trustees are looking to make some changes to be more drought tolerant. We are getting professional input on a design to remove the grass features around the church and install decorative rock and bark. The intention is to reduce our water use and keep our Lord's house looking tidy. If anyone is interested in the project and would like to provide some feedback you can contact Bruce, Keith or Bob. You may see the lawn suddenly brown out but that means we're starting the process!

The solar project is getting held up in the permitting process. There aren't any real issues, we just hear there are delays in processing permits due to the pandemic. We will let you know when construction will begin as soon as we hear.

Pastor is getting new flooring in his study. The carpet currently in place just does not hold up to the traffic so a vinyl plank flooring will be installed in or about October.

LUTHERAN WOMEN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE

The loose coins in the collection plate over the past months have been assisting Lutheran Women's Missionary League to fund mission grants. Thank you all.

Seven of the twenty grants have been funded so far. The most recent was to train pastors in Bay Area churches to develop leaders in cross culture communities for the ministry.

Proposed Changes to the Church's Constitution and Bylaws

Our next Voters Assembly (Meeting) is scheduled for November 14th, after Sunday service. At this meeting, we will consider changes to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Church. The current versions of the Constitution and Bylaws have not been altered for several years and should be updated to address the changing nature of our congregation. In short, we as a congregation, have become smaller and a bit older, and as a result, the way we are currently organized does not allow us to conduct the business of the congregation efficiently. Changes to the Constitution require approval from the Voters Assembly at two consecutive meetings. Changes to the Bylaws require approval from the Voters Assembly at one meeting. The proposed changes are summarized below:

Changes to the Constitution:

The name of the church is changed from the *Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church of Chico, California* to the *Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, Chico, California* to be in conformance with the Articles of Incorporation.

Changes to the Bylaws:

- The requirement for new members to sign the Constitution and Bylaws to be able to vote is eliminated. (We haven't been doing this for years.)
- The requirement for new members to attend one Voters Assembly prior to the Voters Assembly at which they are eligible to vote is eliminated.
- The requirement to hold Voters Assemblies during May and November is replaced with a requirement to hold at least one meeting annually and possibly more often at the discretion of the Church Council.
- Notice of <u>upcoming Voters Assemblies</u> may be made through verbal announcements at services, bulletin announcements, newsletter announcements, phone tree messages, or electronic notifications (such as Flocknote, email, Webpage, etc.)
- A quorum at a Voters Assembly shall consist of fifteen (instead of twenty) members of the voting membership, with two (instead of three) legal officers present.
- Regarding legal officers, the *Treasurer* position is eliminated. The *Financial Secretary* position is renamed *Financial Manager*.
- The Board of Parish Fellowship is renamed the Board of Fellowship. The Board of Public Relations is eliminated. The Board of Youth replaces both the Board of Young Peoples Work and the Board of Christian Education (Parochial School, Pre-school/Day Care, and Sunday School).
- The President may appoint congregational members to fill vacant positions and establish committees not listed in the Bylaws with approval from the Church Council.
- The term of office for all officers is one year.
- The requirement for the Church Council to meet six times a year is eliminated. The church council shall meet at the discretion of the President, with consultation from the Church Council.
- Electronic voting (text, email, etc.) is authorized for Church Council agenda items when needed at the discretion of the President.
- Church Council meetings may be held face to face or by video / audio conference (or any combination thereof), provided that all council members have access to attend the meetings.

The Liturgical year for Church and Home

Pentecost

From Pentecost through the following Saturday

The Theme

The season of Pentecost is actually not a "season," but an octave, or week-long celebration of the Feast of Pentecost. Most congregations participate in the feast only on the Sunday of Pentecost itself, but where there is opportunity to do so, there should be a celebration each day of the week following.

This feast closes the festival half of the church year. It is often called "The birthday of the church," although the church has existed from the creation. The event commemorated is the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the church, giving a new meaning to the Old Testament feast celebrated that day. Christ had promised that He would send the Spirit after He ascended into heaven, so that His work would continue after He withdrew His visible presence.

The work of the Holy Spirit is that of building the church. He does this through the means of grace, the word and sacrament. He does not call attention to Himself, but always points to Christ and His work. The Nicene Creed succinctly lists the things that the Holy Spirit does: He is the giver of life; He speaks by the prophets; He creates the one holy catholic and apostolic church; He is poured out on a person when he is baptized; He gives forgiveness of sins; He will resurrect the bodies of all people; He will give eternal life to those who believe in Christ.

Luther's Small Catechism explains this work, under the third article of the Apostle's Creed:

I believe that I cannot, by my own reason or strength, believe in Jesus Christ, or come to Him, but the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the one true faith; even as He calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith; in which Christian church He daily and richly forgives all sins to me and to all believers, and will at the last day raise up me and all the dead, and give to me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true!

The Mood

The mood of this feast is joyful, as people rejoice at a wedding, or at a bountiful harvest. The Old Testament people brought their "first fruits" of their crops to the temple on this day. It was a joyful harvest festival. We, the new Israel bring our selves as a living sacrifice to God. We rejoice in His manifold blessing.

The Holy Spirit empowers us to follow Christ's command to go and preach the Gospel in all the world. "You shall be My witnesses, in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8). This was emphasized by the disciple's speaking the good news to those who came from various countries in the language of their homeland.

The Color

The color of this feast is a glorious, joyful red. It signifies the appearance of what looked like tongues of fire over the heads of the disciples on that first Christian Pentecost.
