

Technology Timeline

Many are becoming increasingly aware of the changes ahead in technology. Some can be alarming and some are meant to plant doubt. Some of the "warnings" posted about your technology can cause concern and anxiety.

Recently you may have noticed that you are receiving notices that your computer does not meet the requirements for Windows 11. Is that true? Probably, to some extent, however, that does not mean you need to rush out and buy a new computer.

If you have been using a computer for any length of time you are aware that software has a lifecycle and you may have been through several versions of various software programs. Windows 10 is no exception. For the last several months you have probably noticed increased advertising for Windows 11 but within the last month or so the upgrade notices have moved into the "warnings" mode. That being that your computer does not meet the requirements to run the new version.

Researching the lifecycle of Windows 10 on several sites as well as the Microsoft site itself the following date is listed for support expiration of Windows 10: October 14, 2025. Does this mean you cannot continue to use Windows 10? No. It does mean that you won't get any more security updates after that date.

So, bottom line: If you do need a new computer, then Windows 11 will be in your future. If you do not need a new computer right now, just ignore the messages you get about your computer not being able to run Windows 11.

As you continue to use your technology in a godly manner, continue to also evaluate the financial resources necessary for newer and better technology.

- **Board of Youth Activities** (chair or member) plans and facilitates educational programs and activities for the youth of the congregation.

Proposed Changes to the Church's Constitution and Bylaws

Our next Voters Assembly (Meeting) is scheduled for November 14th, after Sunday service. At this meeting, we will decide whether or not to make changes to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Church. The current versions of the Constitution and Bylaws have not been altered for several years and should be updated to address the changing nature of our congregation. In short, we as a congregation, have become smaller and a bit older, and as a result, the way we are currently organized does not allow us to conduct the business of the congregation efficiently. Changes to the Constitution require approval from the Voters Assembly at two consecutive meetings. Changes to the Bylaws require approval from the Voters Assembly at one meeting. The proposed changes are summarized below:

Changes to the Constitution:

The name of the church is changed from the *Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church of Chico, California* to the *Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, Chico, California* to be in conformance with the Articles of Incorporation.

Changes to the Bylaws:

- The requirement for new members to sign the Constitution and Bylaws to be able to vote is eliminated. (We haven't been doing this for years.)
- The requirement for new members to attend one Voters Assembly prior to the Voters Assembly at which they are eligible to vote is eliminated.
- The requirement to hold Voters Assemblies during May and November is replaced with a requirement to hold at least one meeting annually and possibly more often at the discretion of the Church Council.
- Notice of <u>upcoming Voters Assemblies</u> may be made through verbal announcements at services, bulletin announcements, newsletter announcements, phone tree messages, or electronic notifications (such as Flocknote, email, Webpage, etc.)
- A quorum at a Voters Assembly shall consist of fifteen (instead of twenty) members of the voting membership, with two (instead of three) legal officers present.
- Regarding legal officers, the *Treasurer* position is eliminated. The *Financial Secretary* position is renamed *Financial Manager*.
- The Board of Parish Fellowship is renamed the Board of Fellowship. The Board of Public Relations is eliminated. The Board of Youth replaces both the Board of Young Peoples Work and the Board of Christian Education (Parochial School, Pre-school/Day Care, and Sunday School).
- The President may appoint congregational members to fill vacant positions and establish committees not listed in the Bylaws with approval from the Church Council.
- The term of office for all officers is one year.
- The requirement for the Church Council to meet six times a year is eliminated. The church council shall meet at the discretion of the President, with consultation from the Church Council.
- Electronic voting (text, email, etc.) is authorized for Church Council agenda items when needed at the discretion of the President.
- Church Council meetings may be held face to face or by video / audio conference (or any combination thereof), provided that all council members have access to attend the meetings.
- Distribution guidance for the Scholarship Endowment Trust Fund is adjusted to reflect supporting students attending a LCMS university or seminary. (Recent addition)

DOWN SYNDROME SHOULD NEVER BE A DEATH SENTENCE

Shockingly, the left cheers as 67% of Down syndrome babies are aborted in the womb

In 1927, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Buck v. Bell to uphold the state of Virginia's "right" to forcibly sterilize Carrie Buck, a victim of sexual abuse and exploitation whom the state had deemed too "feebleminded" to deserve to reproduce. After this ruling, states across the country went on to forcibly sterilize over 70,000 Americans with disabilities.

Today, Americans look back on this dark history of eugenics and discrimination with shame and regret. We rightly abhor the obvious coercion on display and the hatred and disrespect of people with disabilities that it presumes.

But hateful and deadly discrimination against people with

differing abilities persists today, and the abortion industry fuels it. Today, America doesn't sterilize the disabled; instead, America kills them in the womb.

Every year, there are approximately 6,000 babies born in the U.S. with Down syndrome, the most common chromosomal abnormality. But what many people don't realize is that these 6,000 babies are rare survivors.

We must understand why. While Down syndrome can, in some cases, lead to fatal complications later in life, most children born with Down syndrome can grow up to live long, happy and beautiful lives; 99% of people with Down syndrome say they are happy with their lives and love their families.

The problem is that the abortion industry doesn't want these lives to be lived. In the United States, roughly 67% of all preborn children diagnosed with Down syndrome while in the womb are aborted. While these statistics are shocking enough, the most disturbing part isn't the number of lives lost; it's how this discriminatory violence is encouraged and celebrated by our culture.

When Texas passed S.B. 8, its Heartbeat Act, there was uproar from the abortion industry and the prochoice lobby. Protecting preborn lives doesn't sit right with a business that is rooted in and continues to perpetuate today the principles of the eugenics movement.

But as the father of a daughter with Down syndrome, what was most shocking to me was the

voices decrying how S.B. 8 might lead to an increase in the number of babies born with Down syndrome.

Our culture's dehumanizing disdain for children with Down syndrome is starkly reflected in the way we talk about Down syndrome, too. The media runs articles discussing how "successful" countries like Iceland are at "eliminating Down Syndrome."

All of this is a grim and, frankly, unconscionable euphemism.

Down syndrome is not a disease, like polio or measles, that can be eliminated through medical interventions, vaccines or treatments. When people talk euphemistically about "reducing," "eliminating," or even "eradicating" Down syndrome, what they are talking about is the targeted, discriminatory and intentional killing of people with Down syndrome. We might as well talk about "eliminating" shortness, blue eyes, or a certain skin color.

Our culture of death tries to hide this eugenicist, discriminatory campaign against human life behind a facade of compassion and care for the "hardships" children born with Down syndrome might face later in life.

But it's all based on lies. My daughter Josie will surely face hardships as she grows up with Down syndrome. But the biggest hardship of all will come, not from her diagnosis, but from confronting a culture that falsely tells her, we would have been better off if she was killed in the womb.

October is Down syndrome awareness month. And while there's a lot that people need to know about what it is like to live with Down syndrome – including the joy and the goodness of loving and parenting children with Down syndrome – what our culture most needs is a wake-up call.

Right now, a diagnosis of Down syndrome is a death sentence for 67% of the babies who have this relatively common condition. That has to change. Every human being, regardless of their ability or disability, deserves the right to live. The abortion industry wants to make money off of denying this basic fact of human dignity. We can't allow that to continue.

LUTHERANISM 101: THE HISTORY OF COMMUNION



One of the best things about becoming a confessional Lutheran was receiving a greater appreciation for the sacraments. The first time I attended Divine Service at Redeemer, I was surprised to see communion occurring. I asked the couple next to me, "You're having communion today? It must be

a special occasion." to which they replied "Oh no, we have communion every Sunday." I was intrigued by this.

The constant theme of the Bible - front to back and beginning to end - is Jesus, so it became no surprise to me as I studied communion, I recalled a few times I had read where Jesus actually facilitated a type of communion before He had even instituted the sacrament. For example, if you read Matthew 14, Jesus broke bread and fish and fed 5,000 men not including the women and children accompanying them.

The most interesting one to me however, is all the way back in Genesis 14 when Melchizedek the king of Salem (later to become Jerusalem) brought out bread and wine to Abraham (then named Abram) and blessed him. In return Abram gave a tenth of all that he had to Melchizedek. Who was Melchizedek anyway? In Hebrews 7, the writer talks about the priestly order of Melchizedek and that Jesus was from his priestly line because Melchizedek had no beginning or end. No earthly generational line. Melchizedek was indestructible and even David acknowledges this in Psalm 110 when prophesying the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ.

In the Old Testament, the Hebrews offered up animal sacrifices facilitated by the Levites for which they fed and clothed them. Today we support our pastors and missionaries through tithes and donations. Because of Christ's priesthood, we have also been called to be priests with Him in His infinitely uncreated priesthood that has no beginning or end. The interesting thing about communion is that we are receiving the benefits of His perfect sacrifice - the body and blood of the Lamb of God. Communion feeds and clothes us just as the Levites were by the Hebrews through their old covenant with God. but in perfect righteousness. Communion is the new covenant and fulfillment of God's promise to His people.

We Praise God for Sustaining Life in and through His Word

The nation resounds with thanksgiving for the earth's bountiful harvest, crops of wheat and grains, all beneath the canopy of God's almighty care. But "man does not live by bread alone, but man lives by every word that comes from the mouth of the LORD" (Deut. 8:1-10). The Church is the vessel through which the Word of God penetrates the world with its Law and Gospel. It is this divine Word that proclaims Jesus as the sole source of life, health and wholeness. It is Jesus who heals lepers with His Word: "Go and show yourselves to the priests" (Luke 17:11-19). Of the 10 cleansed, only one expresses thanksgiving back to Jesus. But true gratitude proceeds from a heart sustained by faith. Jesus bids this one Samaritan to "rise and go your way; your faith has made you well." So also, we are sent from the Divine Service, bolstered in our faith by baptismal and Eucharist blessings to be thankful in our circumstances of plenty and hunger, abundance and need (Phil. 4:6-20).

The Lord Freely Feeds and Provides for Us with Everything He Has

Those who contribute "large sums" from "out of their abundance" have done very little. They cannot purchase God's favor with their money. But the "poor widow" with her two small coins, who "out of her poverty has put in everything she had," entrusts herself and her life to the mercy of God (Mark 12:41-44). Such faith is not disappointed, for the Lord is faithful, and He provides for His people by His grace. Thus was the poor widow of Zarephath able to feed the prophet Elijah "for many days," as well as herself and her household, "according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah" (1 Kings 17:15–16). He feeds us, too, by His Word, not only with daily bread for this body and life, but unto the life everlasting in Christ Jesus. "By the sacrifice of himself," by the giving of His body and life and all that He had, He has entered "into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf" (Heb. 9:24–26). He is our great High Priest and the Temple of God, as well as the priestly food with which He feeds us.

TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (Proper 28B) (14 November 2021) Daniel 12:1–3 Hebrews 10:11–25 Mark 13:1–13

The Crucified and Risen Body of Christ Jesus Is the True Temple of God

Despite its "wonderful stones" and "great buildings," the Jerusalem temple would be torn down, with not one stone left upon another, just as this present world and its kingdoms will come to an end (Mark 13:1–8). But that temple pointed beyond itself to Christ, to His sacrifice upon the cross and to the resurrection of His body as the true Temple of God. In the midst of sin and death, by the proclamation of the Gospel, He now gathers disciples into His body, wherein "the one who endures to the end will be saved" (Mark 13:10–13). For He is "a great priest over the house of God," who "will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more." By the pure water of His Baptism, they "draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith," and by His flesh and blood, they enter the Holy of Holies (Heb. 10:17–22). Thus are His people delivered, "everyone whose name shall be found written in the book." For by the wisdom of His Gospel, He turns "many to righteousness," so that "many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake" to everlasting life (Dan. 12:1–3).

LAST SUNDAY OF THE CHURCH YEAR

Isaiah 51:4–6 or Daniel 7:9–10, 13–14 Jude 20–25 or Revelation 1:4b–8 Mark 13:24–37 or John 18:33–37

In Repentance We Are Alert to the Coming of Christ

The signs of the end are all around us, constant reminders that "heaven and earth will pass away." But all of these signs are centered in the cross of Christ, whereby He has conquered sin and death, that we might be raised with Him in righteousness through His Word of the Gospel, which "will not pass away" (Mark 13:31). He is "the firstborn of the dead," who in His great love "has freed us from our sins by his blood" (Rev. 1:5). His salvation is certain because "his dominion is an everlasting dominion" and His kingdom "shall not be destroyed" (Dan. 7:14). For this purpose He came into the world, to reign in love through His voice of the Gospel, which is the truth (John 18:37). So is the righteousness of Christ "a light to the peoples," which "will never be dismayed" because it is the justice of His cross and resurrection (Is. 51:4-6). As He "is able to keep you from stumbling and to present you blameless before the presence of his glory," so wait upon "the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ that leads to eternal life" (Jude 20–24)

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT (28 November 2021)

Jeremiah 33:14–16 1 Thessalonians 3:9–13 Luke 19:28–40 or Luke 21:25–36

The Lord Jesus Comes in Humility to Redeem Us

The season of Advent focuses on the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, and this first Sunday establishes this theme for the rest of the season. The Son of God came long ago to be our Savior, "a righteous Branch" descended from David (Jer. 33:15). As He then came into Jerusalem, riding on a lowly donkey to sacrifice Himself for the sins of the world (Luke 19:28-40), so does He come to His Church today in the humility of Word and Sacrament to deliver the fruits of His Passion: the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. He absolves us and establishes our hearts "blameless in holiness before our God and Father" (1 Thess. 3:13). The same Lord Jesus, who came to Jerusalem then and who comes to us now in peace, will come again with power and great glory on the Last Day. Then there will be "distress of nations in perplexity," with "people fainting with fear." Yet, as we anticipate that great and terrible day, He bids us to rest securely in Him: "Raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near" (Luke 21:25, 26, 28)

CELEBRATION OF LIFE?

Celebration of Life. This phrase has become more commonly used in past years, probably because our sensitive hearts can't handle words like "funeral," which makes sense. It does come from the Latin word for "dearth," after all. That word is far too negative. Far too final. Far too dark. Far too real. It doesn't evoke positive emotion but is far more tied to grief and sorrow. Emotions aren't enjoyable, so why would it make sense to call it something that is tied to grief. Let's celebrate instead. Celebrating is joyful, fun, and is reminiscent of better days when the deceased was still breathing. So, let's just celebrate. Don't mind the corpse lying in the box.

Or the ashes in the urn. Don't mind the elephant in the room named death. Instead, let's celebrate life, let's smile, laugh, and remember how good a person this was.

But I have a question about these celebrations, if they were so great, so good, so loving and caring, why are they dead? Of course, at the celebration of life, no one celebrates the deceased and their faults and failures. No one celebrates the fact that they were a bad parent who neglected their children. No one celebrates the fact that occasionally they drank too much. No one celebrates the fact that they were a gossip, or a poor friend, untrustworthy, a thief, an addict, or whatever other failure everyone knows about but chooses to paint over with makeup like the one in the casket. The reality is there isn't much to celebrate, at least not about that person lying there before you. They were a failure. They sinned, fell short, and failed in their vocations time and again. Of course, they are loved. Even more so then, let's not ignore the reality of death. Instead, let's face it head-on.

A funeral is to greet death. Don't get me wrong, funerals are celebratory... But not of the life that was lived and is now lost. Instead, they are celebratory only when they are in Christ. Funerals are meant to acknowledge death, not hide from him or gloss over it with sweet stories and empty platitudes. Funerals are meant for grieving people to come and be comforted not by reminiscing (although it's not a bad thing) but by hearing the proclamation that death is defeated and conquered enemy. Funerals are for the hope of an



empty grave and new life in the presence of God in the new creation. Funerals are where death is defeated and no longer rule and reign. For funerals are where Christ's death and resurrection are proclaimed, not a eulogy with a list of works that are like filthy rags. Now don't get me wrong, there is a time and a place for eulogies, fond memories, and laughs remembering beloved deceased. But the funeral, the funeral is where Christ is central. Where his life, death and resurrection, and imminent return are the focus. For those are the only things that save.

So, set aside this phrase. It is therapeutic at best but doesn't bring much comfort. It doesn't focus on the one person who lived that can truly bring those who have died back to life. It focuses on someone that could not save themselves. Stick with "funeral" for there you will greet death and look at it face to face. You will hear of death's defeat; you will hear of it being swallowed up forever. At a funeral, you will grieve as one should, for greeting death comes with acknowledging what it is, a curse, an enemy, and evil. Yet, at a funeral, you will not grieve without hope. For here you will hear of the one person who has lived, the God-man, who lived, died, and rose, for you. So, I suppose if you must celebrate, make it a Celebration of Resurrection. For Christ will return, and he will return soon, and he will raise all those dear children from their graves, and they will be alive, celebrating in the presence of God and the Lamb. Forever.
