

WE CELEBRATE SUFFERING

A merry Lent to all of you as we ponder, reflect, give thanks, and celebrate the passion of our Lord Jesus and all that he suffered and endured for us and our salvation.

Yes, Lent is a time of forty days to read and hear about the suffering of Jesus as told in the Gospels. He was tempted. He was mocked. He was struck. He was rejected. He was whipped. He was painfully and horribly nailed to a cross. He

suffered great agony and humility, hanging naked, stripped of all dignity and worth.

We celebrate the suffering of Jesus for us because by his cross we are healed, we are forgiven, and we are saved by grace through faith in Him.

But, what about this matter of suffering? You've heard the argument, "If there is a God, then why does suffering exist and why does He allow it?"

Without God, suffering does not make sense? Without suffering, God does not make sense. Wrap your mind around these two thoughts.

If God did not exist, there would be no humanity. God created Adam and Eve, thus creating all human beings. If there was no humanity there would be no original sin. Sin entered the world through Adam and Eve. If there were no original sin, there would be no purpose to suffering and humanity would be like another neutral being, much like an animal, which has no soul. But if there were no purpose to suffering and even if suffering could theoretically be eliminated, there would be no



purpose for even the concept of God. Death could be solved and should have been solved by now, after all these years of medical advances.

But humanity is not a neutral creature, so our suffering must mean that God exists. Because we cannot eliminate suffering and death, and we are most often the cause of it. We are a rebellious creature living in God's creation.

Many people want to live in a world where suffering does not exist. Atheism must deny suffering and deny the only way to make sense of it.

God suffered. God suffered in the person of Jesus Christ to invite you into his sufferings, death, and resurrection.

So, if you ask, "If there is a God then why does suffering exist?" that is the same as asking, "If there is a God, then why did he suffer like that for me?"

These are weighty and perplexing questions. These questions supply the evidence and reason for God's love shown to me in the person and work of Jesus Christ.

Ultimately, we are at a loss for words as we address the heavy and philosophical issues related to suffering and, finally, death. It is all too much for us to handle.

Yet, we celebrate and lift high the cross of Jesus this Lent, as we prepare for the resurrection. We celebrate and give our joyful thanks to the Lord that he suffered for my sake.

WALKING FOR EXERCISE

- 1. Set aside a specific time of day to walk. Choose a time when you are usually not tired.
- 2. Try to walk every other day.
- 3. Wear comfortable socks and supportive shoes that fit well.
- 4. Before starting your walk, warm up the muscles you will be using by doing low-level stretching for a few minutes.
- 5. Start walking within your comfort range. Walking should not cause pain or stiffness, nor should it make you feel breathless or off balance.
- 6. Try to walk a little farther and a little faster each week, but do not increase your distance or pace more than once a week.
- 7. If you have problems such as chest discomfort, shortness of breath, or leg pain, do not increase your distance or pace without first talking to your doctor.
- 8. After walking, stretch your muscles again for a few minutes.
- 9. Delay your post-exercise shower until you reach your resting heart rate.

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Bible Gateway is an app for your phone or tablet that can indeed help you redeem your time. The basic app is free but there is also an extended version for \$3.99 per month if you are looking for more content.

- When you open the app there is a daily verse in the translation you have chosen from the settings menu. This can be a daily nugget to ponder.
- You can set up a daily reading plan.
- You can search for a verse you are trying to locate in scripture.
- There are various resources such as note taking, highlighting, saving favorite verses.
- You can open Bible Gateway on your computer as well and anything you add, such as a note, is saved across devices.
- Audio Bible is available through the app on your phone or tablet as well as on your computer. This feature is great when you are waiting in line, caught in a traffic jam or perhaps out for a walk. You might want to keep some ear buds handy.

Consider using this app as a means to redeeming not wasting your time and using technology as a godly tool.



The week before Easter is called Holy Week. Our Lenten preparation and repentance deepens as we focus on the events of Jesus' life from His entrance into Jerusalem until His death on the cross and burial in the garden tomb.

Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week, commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (Matthew 21:1–11). Because the complete account of the Lord's Passion from Matthew, Mark, or Luke is often read, this Sunday is also called the Sunday of the Passion.

On Holy (Maundy) Thursday, the Church gives thanks to Jesus for the institution of His Supper. This is a feast day, and the color used to decorate the church is white. The Holy Thursday service closes with the stripping of the altar. This reminds us of how our Lord stripped to the waist to wash His disciples' feet—and how He was stripped and beaten before His crucifixion.

Good Friday is the most solemn of all days in the Christian Church; yet a note of joy remains, as the title of the day indicates. On Good Friday, as we remember that on account of our sin the Lord was crucified

and died, we give joyful thanks to God that all sin and God's wrath over sin falls on Jesus and not on us, and that by His grace we receive the benefit of this most sacrificial act.

During Holy Week, we worship our Lord, who gave His life for us.



HOLY WEEK PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- In many churches, the color for Holy Week continues to be violet. In others, the color is scarlet, a deep blood red. Scarlet reminds us of Jesus' blood shed as He suffered and died for our sins.
- Many congregations read the Passion narrative during special midweek services of Lent. But on each day of Holy Week, the whole story of the events leading to Jesus' death and burial is read from a single Gospel.
- While in Lent, we forego using the joyous Alleluia response, and we do not sing the Gloria in Excelsis. In Holy Week, we go a step further as we give up singing the Gloria Patri—our joyous praise to the Trinity at the end of all the Psalms we use in worship. Omitting these joyous words makes our worship even more reserved and somber.
- Many churches observe Holy Week by gathering for special services throughout the week.



Easter is not merely a one-day celebration; it is a fifty-day season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season—one seventh of the year—is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.

The first celebration of Easter is the Easter Vigil, the evening of Holy Saturday. The Vigil includes a service of light, in which fire symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world. The service is designed to take the Christian from the solemnity of Good Friday to the predawn joy of Easter.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Congregations may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ, as well as services that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. While not as lavish, this joyous and celebratory tone echoes down through the Sundays of the Easter season.

Forty days after Easter, the Church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by early Christians to commemorate the first great harvest of believers for Christ. Thus, Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian Church, as the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and they gave their compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. The color for the Day for Pentecost is red, representing fire and blood. Red recalls the tongues of fire received on the first Pentecost and the martyrs who shed their blood for the faith.

During Easter, we rejoice in our salvation.



EASTER PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The colors of Easter are white and gold. White, the color our Lord's holiness, is
 everywhere on Easter, from the paraments and vestments to the traditional Easter
 lilies. Gold decorations remind us that our resurrection life in Christ is precious and
 eternal.
- After a long absence in Lent, Alleluia returns at Easter and is heard everywhere in the propers appointed for the weeks after Easter. Also, the joyous Hymn of Praise and the Gloria Patri return and are sung as part of the liturgy once again.
- During the Easter season, we greet one another with a special Easter greeting and response: "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

2. Divine characteristics are transferred to the human nature by virtue of the Personal Union. We can say Jesus the Man is all-powerful, all-knowing, etc., because He is the God-Man. So He could know people's thoughts, perform miracles, etc. But the human characteristics are not transferred to the divine nature.

3. All that Jesus is — God and Man — works together for our salvation.

The Two Natures are truly and inseparably joined in the Personal Union without being mingled, changed:unconfusedlyunchangeablyindivisiblyinseparably

Neither flesh outside word, nor word outside flesh

A Brief Definition of the Communication of Attributes (Characteristics)

1. The attributes of the human nature and the attributes of the divine nature are shared in the same person but are not essential to both natures. Each nature has its own essential attributes. (*Genus Idiomaticum*)

2. The Divine attributes are transferred to the human nature by virtue of the Personal Union. But they never become an essential attribute of the human nature. The communication is strictly one way. (*Genus Majestaticum*)

3. The full set of attributes work for our salvation. The redemption of mankind is accomplished by the theanthropic (God-Man) person of Jesus Christ. (*Genus Apotelesmaticum*)

LECTIONARY SUMMARIES

FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Isaiah 43:16–21 Philippians 3:(4b–7) 8–14 Luke 20:9–20

GOD'S BELOVED SON HAS REDEEMED US

Our life and works apart from Christ, no matter how they may glitter to the eyes of the world, are ultimately rubbish and have no righteousness. Rather, in the scandalous cross of Jesus, we find our righteousness alone "through faith in Christ" (Phil. 3:9). By such faith, we "know him and the power of his resurrection" (Phil. 3:10). For the same God who brought Israel out of Egypt has done a "new thing" for us in Christ Jesus (Is. 43:19). He has sent His beloved Son into His vineyard to be killed by sinful men and to become "the stone that the builders rejected." Yet, the One rejected by men "has become the cornerstone" of His Church (Luke 20:17). Through the waters of Holy Baptism, He provides us daily refreshment in our earthly pilgrimage, "a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Is. 43:19).

PALM SUNDAY / SUNDAY OF THE PASSION (10 April 2022)

John 12:12–19 (Palm Sunday Procession) Deuteronomy 32:36–39 Philippians 2:5–11 Luke 22:1–23:56 or Luke 23:1–56 or John 12:20–43

The Cross and Passion of Our Lord Are the Hour of His Glory

The King of Israel comes into His royal glory by the path of humble obedience "to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 2:8). He "goes as it has been determined" (Luke 22:22), according to the Scriptures, willingly submitting to His Father's plan for the salvation of sinners. "Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name" (Phil. 2:9). His suffering and death open the way of repentance for the forgiveness of sins because He goes to the cross bearing the sins of the world. In His resurrection, God the Father vindicates His people and has compassion on His servants (Deut. 32:36). He kills to make alive; He wounds in order to heal. In remembrance of Him, we praise God, confessing "that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Phil. 2:11).

(3 April 2022) HOLY (MAUNDY) THURSDAY (14 April 2022)

Jeremiah 31:31–34 or Exodus 12:1–14 Hebrews 10:15–25 or 1 Corinthians 11:23–32 Luke 22:7–20 or John 13:1–17, 31b–35

LET US LOVE ONE ANOTHER, AS CHRIST JESUS HAS LOVED US

By Holy Baptism, "with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water" (Heb. 10:22), we enter the holy place with Jesus. For Jesus is our Passover Lamb who has been sacrificed for us. He reclines at table with us and feeds us with His own flesh and blood: "the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain" (Heb. 10:20). In Christ, the Lord remembers us in mercy and remembers our sin no more; He forgives us all our iniquity (Jer. 31:34; Heb. 10:17). With such love, He "loved his own who were in the world," and He even loves us "to the end" (John 13:1). As He washes us and feeds us in love, let us love one another, just as He has loved us (John 13:34).

GOOD FRIDAY

(15 April 2022)

Isaiah 52:13–53:12 Hebrews 4:14–16; 5:7–9 John 18:1–19:42 or John 19:17–30

BEHOLD THE LAMB OF GOD, WHO TAKES AWAY THE SIN OF THE WORLD

Jesus, the Lamb of God, is led to the slaughter of His cross as the sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the world. "Despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief" (Is. 53:3), He is the righteous Servant who justifies many by His innocent suffering and death. He bears our griefs and carries our sorrows; He is wounded for our transgressions; He is crushed for our iniquities; He suffers our chastisement, so that "with his wounds we are healed" (Is. 53:4-5). As the Son of God, He fulfills the Law for us in human flesh, and so fulfills the Scriptures (John 19:7, 24). In perfect faith and faithfulness. He shares all our weaknesses and temptations, "yet without sin" (Heb. 4:15), and as our merciful High Priest, He brings us to the Father in peace.

(16 April 2022)

Daniel 6:1–24 1 Peter 4:1–8 Matthew 27:57–66

WE LIVE AND LOVE IN THE PEACE AND PROMISE OF THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST JESUS

The disciples of Christ Jesus, like St. Joseph of Arimathea, deal in love with the body of Christ, in the sure and certain promise of the resurrection (Matt. 27:57–60). For they also remember what He said, that after three days He would rise, though His enemies conspire against Him and seek to thwart Him (Matt. 27:63). Indeed, we find a type and promise of the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ already in the prophet Daniel. For he was blameless and faithful, and "an excellent spirit was in him" (Dan. 6:3-4, 22). Although he was accused and delivered over to death, the Lord preserved his life and raised him up in righteousness, "because he had trusted in his God" (Dan. 6:23). So let us also pray and give thanks to God (Dan. 6:10), finding peace and Sabbath rest in Jesus Christ. And knowing that "the end of all things is at hand," let us be "self-controlled and sober-minded," and "keep loving one another earnestly" (1 Peter 4:7-8).

EASTER DAY

Isaiah 65:17–25 1 Corinthians 15:19–26 Luke 24:1–12

CHRIST'S RESURRECTION IS THE FIRSTFRUITS OF THE NEW CREATION

The Lord has promised to "create new heavens and a new earth" (Is. 65:17), in which His people shall abide in peace and joy. That new creation has begun in the bodily resurrection of Christ Jesus. All the baptized belong to that new creation. Reborn of water and the Holy Spirit, they are "the offspring of the blessed of the LORD" (Is. 65:23). The Lord rejoices and is glad in them; He hears and answers their prayers. For "if in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied" (1 Cor. 15:19). But Christ Jesus has been raised, "the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Cor. 15:20). We may be "perplexed about this" (Luke 24:4), perhaps even frightened and brought to our knees, because it seems like an "idle tale" (Luke 24:11). But faith clings to the Word of Christ and finds His resurrected body — not in the tomb, but in His Holy Supper.

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER (24 April 2022)

Acts 5:12–20 (21–32) Revelation 1:4–18 John 20:19–31

That You May Believe and Have Life in His Name

On the Lord's Day, St. John the apostle was given a revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last. He is the Living One, "the firstborn of the dead" (Rev. 1:5). He died for all people, and behold, He is alive forevermore! Therefore, He has "the keys of Death and Hades" (Rev. 1:18). For His death atoned for sin and conquered death, and in His resurrection He opened the kingdom of heaven to us. The "sharp two-edged sword" of His mouth (Rev. 1:16) calls you to "believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God," that by such faith "you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). To that end, He sends His ministers of the Word, as the Father sent Him, "to give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins" (Acts 5:31).



The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod's Birthday

The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod celebrates its birthday on April 26. Initial members, which included 12 pastors representing 14 congregations Illinois, from Indiana, Missouri, Michigan, New York and Ohio, signed the



church body's constitution on April 26, 1847, at First Saint Paul Lutheran Church in Chicago, Ill.

Originally named The German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States, the name was shortened to The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod in 1947 on the occasion of our 100th anniversary.

The roots of the LCMS run deep, tracing back to Saxon and other German immigrants establishing a new church body in America, seeking the freedom to practice and follow confessional Lutheranism.




