

And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. (Deut 6: 6-7 ESV)

Have you marked your calendar yet? Your family calendar probably has markings for everyone's birthday, special events, family gatherings and a whole gambit of other activities. However, do you mark your calendar with the events of the church year?

Advent is the beginning of the church year. Advent means coming and of course this is about the coming of Jesus, the Messiah. It is about his coming as a baby, born of Mary, and the long sought Messiah of the Hebrews.



Wise Men Seek the Savior: Family Advent Activity Kit is a great way for your family to celebrate Advent but to also prepare your hearts for this new church year. What does it include?

TECHNOLOGY

Technology... deceiving?

Almost daily there is something that pops up in your email inbox or even as a text on your phone that "alerts" you to something going to happen. You are encouraged to "click on" or forward to

happen. You are encouraged to "click on" or forward to others or call the listed number. Do you? Should you? How reliable is that email or text? Where did it come from?

Many have been caught in a scam such as "Your grandson, or somebody else close to you, has been arrested and needs \$xxxx for bail. Call this 1-800 number to transfer the funds to get him released." Another type is from a company identified as something you might know or even use saying that there have been subscription changes and once you call the 800 number and talk to somebody you can be convinced to give them remote access to your computer so "they" could fix it for you. The next thing you know your financial information has been compromised.

What should you do?

Tip 1: don't EVER call the number in a suspicious email - Manually look up the company billing department number to verify.

Tip 2: Don't EVER do a remote session on your computer on the advice of a "tech" about a billing issue. If your computer "is" compromised you'd rather deal with someone local that you know. **Accounting people are not IT people.**

Remember the game "Simon says" that you may still play with your grandchildren. After a few commands from Simon there is one with no "Simon says" and chances are you still do what was commanded. That is the concept behind "phishing." Just about every post on Facebook (and other social media platforms) except for your friend's original posts, are very likely ad based and somewhere along the line there can very well be a scammer trolling to get you to take the bait. At the very least your email gets added to some list and the next thing you know you are bombarded with ads from a dozen different companies.

What can you do?

Don't forward these posts to friends and don't repost on your Facebook account or other social media.

Check the post out with a fact checker, like snopes.com.

Don't be afraid to contact the friend who sent you the post and ask if they just forwarded it from somebody else or if they actually took the video of the cute puppies or at least know who took the video. You might help countless people out from being caught in a "phishing" net.

Technology is a wonderful tool and extremely helpful. However, during times of isolation like we have recently experienced, there have been many attempts to use it for nefarious means.

Use your technology in a godly manner and rejoice in the gift it truly is!

I am thankful for two pastors in the Salt Lake valley who talked with me openly and often about the pastoral office. I attended Concordia University in Seward, Nebraska, graduating in 2019 with a degree in mathematics and completion of their pre-seminary program. I matriculated to Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne in fall 2019 and I plan on graduating and receiving a call in spring 2023. My immediate family (parents and younger sister) still live in Utah and I have extended family in Utah, Michigan, New Mexico, and Southern California (in the Santa Barbara area).

Voters Assembly - November 13

At our Voters Assembly scheduled for November 13st, we will vote on several items important to the congregation. These include adopting two small changes to the Bylaws, passing a budget for next year (2023), choosing officers and board members for next year (2023), and choosing members for the call committee.

- 1. Change to the Bylaws: The council recommends two amendments to the Bylaws to clarify that the term of office for church officers and board members is to serve from January 1st to December 31st, for the calendar year they are voted in. Current Bylaws state: 4.03 Terms of Office. The terms for officers and board members shall be one year. The second amendment will remove the requirement to form a Board of Stewardship.
- 2. **2023 Budget:** Copies of the proposed 2023 budget may be obtained from office manager, Jackie Vieira
- 3. 2023 Officers & Board Members: Submit nominations for officers and board members to either Fred Sherman, Jerry Brandt, or Pastor Jordan for any position. Self nominations are encouraged. The officer positions are President, Vice President, Secretary, and Financial Manager. Boards include Elders, Trustees, Evangelism, Fellowship, Youth Activities. No experience is necessary. We will train. Please consider participating in one of these positions. Thank you to those completing service on their respective boards: Sherry Godsil, Board of Fellowship; Robert Rean, Board of Trustees; Daryl Smith, Board of Evangelism; Matthew Thomason, Board of Elders.
- 4. Call Committee: Submit nominations for the call committee to Fred Sherman, Jerry Brandt or Pastor Jordan. Per our Bylaws, the call committee will consist of three elders, three members at large, and one pastoral advisor.

God's Plan of Redemption Trumps Earthly Destruction and Violence

There are signs of the Lord's coming all around: the cross that marks His Church, the violence and death of the sinful world, and the shaking of the natural order. "There will be great distress upon the earth" (Luke 21:23), but the faithful know that "the kingdom of God is near" (Luke 21:31). Therefore, "straighten up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near" (Luke 21:28). Be awake and alert, and heed the words of Christ, which "will not pass away" (Luke 21:33). For you, "the sun of righteousness shall rise with healing in its wings" (Mal. 4:2). He sends His preachers of repentance in the spirit and power of Elijah "before the great and awesome day of the LORD comes" (Mal. 4:5), in order to "direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ" (2 Thess. 3:5). Although you are often faithless, "the Lord is faithful," and by the preaching of His Word "he will establish you and guard you against the evil one" (2 Thess. 3:3). Therefore, "do not grow weary in doing good" (2 Thess. 3:13). In the midst of calamity, believe upon the Lord, Jesus Christ.

JESUS CHRIST REIGNS, ENDURING THE CROSS — ITS SCORN AND SHAME

The Lord Jesus reigns in love among those who are baptized in His name. "They shall be mine," He says, "and I will spare them as a man spares his son who serves him" (Mal. 3:17). Jesus' service through crucifixion for sinful men anchors us in new life. In the proclamation of His Son, God makes His justice clear, defining "the distinction between the righteous and the wicked" (Mal. 3:18). He truly is "the King of the Jews" (Luke 23:38), who governs His Church with all authority in heaven and on earth. He has come into His kingdom by His cross, and He graciously remembers us in paradise. Therefore, do not weep for Him, but with repentant faith "weep for yourselves and for your children" (Luke 23:28). Then the mountains and hills of Jerusalem, His holy Church, shall cover you with His righteousness and peace. For He "is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation" (Col. 1:15). "All things were created through him and for him" (Col. 1:16), and "all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell" bodily in Him, reconciling all things to Himself "by the blood of his cross" (Col. 1:19-20

THE LORD COMES IN MEEKNESS AND HUMILITY TO SAVE US NOW

The Lord Jesus enters Jerusalem "humble, and mounted on a donkey," riding on "a beast of burden" (Matt. 21:5), as He Himself bears the sins of the world in His body. Now He comes by the ministry of the Gospel to save us from sin, death, the devil and hell. Therefore, we sing, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Matt. 21:9). For we are called "to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob," His Holy Church, "that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths" (Is. 2:3). By His Word, we "walk in the light of the LORD" (Is. 2:5). That is to live in love, which "does no wrong to a neighbor" (Rom. 13:10). We "cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light," for "salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed" (Rom. 13:11, 12). Hence, the entire Christian life is a time to wake and watch, "for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming" (Matt. 24:42).

"John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, 'Repent'" (Matt. 3:1–2). His preaching of repentance for the forgiveness of sins prepared people for the coming of Christ into the world. St. John's work was historically complete with the incarnate advent of Jesus, but his vital ministry continues in preaching Law and Gospel. The Son of God has come in the flesh, "a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots" (Is. 11:1), and continues to bear the fruits of righteousness. His good tree of the cross is "a signal for the peoples" (Is. 11:10), by which He calls the nations to repentance. "With the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips" (Is. 11:4), He slays the wicked and brings the dead to life, making sons of Abraham out of lifeless stones. So also the "root of Jesse" comes to us, "even he who arises to rule the Gentiles" (Rom. 15:12), that "we might have hope" and be filled "with all joy and peace in believing" (Rom. 15:4, 13).

THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT (11 December 2022)

Isaiah 35:1–10 James 5:7–11 Matthew 11:2–15

THE COMING OF THE LORD JESUS CHRIST BRINGS TRUE REJOICING, EVEN UNDER THE CROSS

Sometimes life requires the astonishing patience of Job. Like him, we are to rejoice in the midst of affliction, be grounded in repentance under the cross of Christ, and hope relentlessly in His resurrection, that we might see "the purpose of the Lord, how the Lord is compassionate and merciful" (James 5:11). In the promise of the Gospel, therefore, "be patient" and "establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand" (James 5:7, 8). Like St. John the Baptist, whatever your own kind of prison or suffering may be, call upon Jesus and receive the strength of His Word from those He sends to you. For as "the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up," so is the Good News of Jesus preached to you also (Matt. 11:5). He comes and restores the fortunes of Zion, His Holy Church, so that "sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Is. 35:10)

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ADVENT (18 December 2022)

Isaiah 7:10–17 Romans 1:1–7 Matthew 1:18–25

GOD'S WORD IS FULFILLED FOR US IN THE FLESH AND BLOOD OF CHRIST JESUS, THE SON OF MARY

The Fourth Sunday in Advent turns our attention toward the Nativity of Our Lord. With the blessed Virgin Mary, we await the coming of the Christ, her Son, conceived in her womb by the Word and Spirit of God. This fulfillment of the sign once given to the house of David, that "the virgin shall conceive and bear a son" (Is. 7:14), is now given to us in the Gospel. It declares that salvation is by His grace alone, entirely His work and a free gift. It also is the way and means by which the Lord our God is Immanuel, "God with us." The almighty and eternal Son of God is conceived and born of Mary, and is thus "descended from David according to the flesh" (Rom. 1:3–4). He comes in this way to save us with His own flesh and blood; wherefore, He is called "Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matt. 1:21). As Joseph received this sign in faith and immediately "did as the angel of the Lord commanded him" (Matt. 1:24), we also live by faith in this Holy Gospel.

CHRISTMAS EVE

(25 December 2022)

Isaiah 9:2–7 Titus 2:11–14 Luke 2:1–14 (15–20)

THE LIGHT OF CHRIST SHINES FORTH IN THE DARKNESS

Heaven and earth rejoice on this night because the glory of the Holy Trinity is manifested in the human birth of "our great God and Savior Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:13), through whom the Father's grace and mercy permeate the world. Death's silence is nullified by this "good news of great joy that will be for all the people" (Luke 2:10). And all we who have gone astray like lost and wandering sheep, who have "walked in darkness" of doubt, fear and sinful unbelief, behold "a great light" in the nativity of Jesus Christ (Is. 9:2). In Him, "the grace of God has appeared" (Titus 2:11). For this child of Mary who is born for us, this dear Son of God who is given to us, bears the burden of our sin and death in His own body on the cross. By initiating and fulfilling His earthly journey from nativity to crucifixion, Christ establishes a government of peace, "with justice and with righteousness," which shall have no end. This is not by any work of man, but "the zeal of the LORD of hosts will do this" (Is. 9:7).

LECTIONARY SUMMARIES (CONTINUED)

CHRISTMAS DAY

(25 December 2022)

Isaiah 52:7–10 Hebrews 1:1–6 (7–12) John 1:1–14 (15–18)

THE LIVING AND LIFE-GIVING WORD OF GOD DWELLS AMONG US IN THE FLESH

The Lord sends out His ministers of the Gospel to make disciples "of all the nations," so that "all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God." The Lord has "bared his holy arm" in the incarnate Christ (Is. 52:7, 10). The child in the manger, born of the Virgin Mary, is the very Word of God, the only begotten Son of the Father, "whom he appointed the heir of all things, through whom also he created the world" (Heb. 1:2). As "all things were made through him" (John 1:3), so are all things redeemed and made new in Him. In His body of flesh and blood, we behold "the radiance of the glory of God" (Heb. 1:3), "glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). He dwells among us in peace, that we might have life and light and salvation in Him. For by His Word of the Gospel, we are born again as the children of God, bearing His name and sharing His eternal life.

EVE OF THE CIRCUMCISION AND NAME OF JESUS (New Year's Eve)(31 December 2022)

Isaiah 30:(8–14) 15–17 Romans 8:31b–39 Luke 12:35–40

OUR TIMES ARE IN HIS HANDS

The Church and the world are awake, but for very different reasons. The world counts down to midnight; the Church watches eagerly for her Master who is "coming at an hour" we "do not expect" (Luke 12:40). For many, the changing year brings regrets, fears and desperate wishes for improvement. The world delights in smooth talk and illusions of prosperity at any cost (Is. 30:9-10). It has already forgotten "the Holy One of Israel" born six days earlier (Is. 30:11). The Church ends the calendar year differently. "In returning and rest ... in quietness and in trust," that is, in repentance and faith, for the Holy One saves us, and He is our strength (Is. 30:15). Our times are in His hands (Ps. 31:15), the hands of Mary's Son — God not only with us, but for us (Matt. 1:23). So, who could be against us? If God has given His Son, "how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?" (Rom. 8:31–32). The Church dresses for action not in fear, but in hope; Christ is coming to serve her with His gifts (Luke 12:37). Who is there to condemn us for the passing year? Christ has died, is raised and intercedes for us! What distress will the new year bring? Nothing "can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:34–39)!

LUTHERAN REFORMATION ALTARPIECE

St. Mary Lutheran Church (Stadt Kirche) in Wittenberg, Germany has this art above the altar, painted by Lucas Cranach the Elder in 1547, the year after Luther's death. It stands as vivid testimony that the Church of the Reformation bears the marks of the Church catholic, resting on Christ alone by grace alone through faith alone, which we receive by Word (the Scriptures) and Sacraments alone.

The paintings not only proclaim the marks of the Church by their depictions of Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and Confession and Absolution, but prominently display the central figures of the Reformation participating in these gifts.

The left panel shows Philip Melanchthon (author of the Augsburg Confession) performing a Baptism.

In the right panel, Johannes Bugenhagen (Luther's pastor at St. Mary's) bears the Office of the Keys, binding the sins of the man on his left, loosing those of the man on his right.

In the large center panel, Luther is shown at the Lord's Supper with the Apostles, offering the chalice to Cranach himself. (Judas, with moneybag by his side and his foot already outside the circle, is shown breaking away from the communion.)

The foundational panel depicts Christ crucified as the central figure upon which the Church of the Reformation rests. Luther is shown in the pulpit with one hand resting on the Scriptures, the other pointing to Jesus. Cranach, along with Luther's wife and son, are among the congregation.

Above the entire work hangs a panel with the words of 1 Corinthians 3:11, "No other foundation can anyone lay that that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ." Indeed, Christ crucified and risen for the life of the world is the eternal Gospel which this masterpiece proclaims to every nation and tribe and language and people.


We receive this gift of sacred art for the glory of God and the spread of the Gospel, and ask God's blessing upon it as people enter the narthex and come into the house of God.

THE TIME OF CHRISTMAS ADVENT

Begins on the fourth Sunday before December 25, or the Sunday closest to the Festival of St. Andrew (November 30), and ends with midday prayer on December 24.



The Savior's birth is second in importance only to His resurrection on Easter Sunday. During the Time of Christmas, Christians reflect on God's great and gracious gift of Himself.

The Church Year begins with Advent (from Latin *adventus*, which means "coming into"), a four-week period of preparation before Christmas. The story of Jesus during Advent is the story of hope coming into the world. When the time was just right, God sent His Son, Jesus, into the world. The Advent season teaches us to prepare to receive Jesus, the hope of the world.

In Advent, we wait for our coming King.

Isaiah 7:14; 9:6; 11:1–2 Luke 1:26–38, 46–55 Micah 5:2



ADVENT PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The color for Advent is blue, which symbolizes anticipation and hope in our coming King. Violet can also be used during Advent as a symbol of our repentance in preparation for our coming King.
- We do not sing the Gloria in Excelsis in the Divine Service during Advent. This is the angels' song at Christmas, so during Advent we pass over this traditional Hymn of Praise in silent anticipation.
- It has become common to use an Advent wreath to mark the season. This wreath
 has four candles—one for each week in Advent. As these candles are lit each
 week, our anticipation mounts as we look forward to Jesus' coming.
- We gather for midweek services. These services heighten our awareness and anticipation for the celebration of Christ's coming in the flesh.

THE TIME OF CHRISTMAS CHRISTMAS AND ITS SEASON

Begins with evening prayer on Christmas Eve (December 24) and ends with midday prayer on January 5.



Christmas tells the story of Jesus as the long-awaited King who has finally come to save us. Jesus, God's Son, the King of heaven and earth, is born in Bethlehem—the Son of God is a baby lying in a manger.

The evening services of Christmas Eve mark the beginning of the Church's celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord. The season continues after December 25 over a period traditionally known as the twelve days of Christmas. This season includes a number of lesser festivals: The Festival of St. Stephen, the first martyr, occurs on December 26. St. John, apostle and evangelist, is remembered on December 27. The death of the babies in Bethlehem (Matthew 2:16–18) is observed on December 28 as the Festival of the Holy Innocents. The circumcision and naming of Jesus on the eighth day after His birth (Luke 2:21) is celebrated on January 1.

At Christmas, we worship our God made flesh.

CHRISTMAS PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- We sing the Gloria in Excelsis and join the angels at Christmas in their Hymn of Praise: "Glory be to God on high: and on earth, peace, goodwill toward men."
- The color for Christmas and its season is white, symbolizing the divinity, eternity, purity, light, and joy of Jesus Christ.
- Many Christians celebrate with special services during the Christmas season. A special Divine Service late on Christmas Eve reminds us how the angels announced the birth of Jesus to shepherds who were "keeping watch over their flock by night." On Christmas Day, we celebrate the Word of God made flesh and receive Him in the Means of Grace. And on January 1, eight days after His birth, we gather in worship to begin the year in His name, Jesus, which means "the Lord saves." for He has come to save His people from their sins.
