THE TIME OF THE CHURCH THE SEASON AFTER PENTECOST

Begins the day after Pentecost and ends with midday prayer on the Saturday before the First Sunday in Advent.



The Sundays after Pentecost make up the longest portion of the Church Year. This is the Time of the Church--the time we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity.

On the first Sunday after Pentecost, the Church celebrates Holy Trinity Sunday. We are baptized into only one name, but that name is "of the father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." There is only one name, only one God--but there are three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. On this Sunday, we confess the great mystery of the Holy Trinity.

The Sundays of this time of the Church Year are known as Sundays after Pentecost (or Sundays after Trinity.) Picking up on Pentecost as the season of growth, they are often referred to as the Green Sundays. The readings focus on the life of Christ in His Church. We hear Jesus teaching His disciples and healing the faithful.

Because the Pentecost season is part of "ordinary" time, congregations may choose to observe some of the lesser festivals of the season. When saint days or commemorations fall on Sundays, worship leaders could highlight these to offer teaching moments about the breadth of the Church's life and work. These noteworthy days enable Christians to reflect on how we worship "with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven."

On the Last Sunday after Pentecost, the Church gives voice to the joyful hope of the second coming of Jesus for the resurrection of the dead and the last judgment. The end-times focus of the Last Sunday of the Church Year bears themes of hope and preparation that are similar to those of Advent, which soon follows.

During the Time of the Church, we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity.

PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The church is decorated in green, the color of growing plants. this marks the season of growth in living in our Baptism and receiving the Lord's Word and Sacraments.
- On Trinity Sunday, we confess the Athanasian Creed, which goes into great detail to confess the catholic (universal) faith that must be faithfully and firmly believed to be saved: 'that we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity."

PASTORAL MEANDERINGS (JUNE 6, 2023)

Who wants it?



Curiously, there seem to be more people interested in finding a painless way out of this life than into an afterlife. It is surprising to me but not quite shocking that the whole notion of eternal life is seen as pointless or strange to a great many people. Add into that the idea of the resurrection and a new and glorious flesh and blood and you have turned the cardinal Christian doctrine into something crazy and unthinkable. That is how deep and broad our acceptance of death and its normality have become. Even Christians who are wedded to many tenets of the orthodox faith are not quite sure that the resurrection and eternal life are all that necessary or even desirable -- especially to the proclamation and witness of the faith. My, how far we have come since St. Paul insisted that without the resurrection and eternal life we have a pitiful faith and are pitiful people.

It should come as no surprise to those who have been to funerals of late. If there is one thing missing from many (dare I say most) funerals today, it is the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting. We all know how quickly Christians warmed up to the idea of a celebration of the life of the deceased instead of a *funeral* and how easily the eulogy replaced the resurrection and eternal life as the core purpose and comfort of the sermon. It was not simply because we love sentiment more than truth but because we have become so comfortable with the notion of death to help us define life that we cannot define it at all without death. In fact, many folks are relieved at the prospect of death and happily ready to cede all existence away than to hang their future on an eternity filled with uncertainty and devoid of the pursuits that fill us with happiness now. At best, we would consent to the idea of a virtual life that continues after the body lay in the grave or the ashes in an urn but even then we seem to want assurances that this virtual life will not be all that different than our present life (and will also have an ending point when we tire of it all).

Our culture loves the idea of limited do overs -the opportunity to start again with all that we know now if only to avoid making the same mistakes. But that is hardly what the Christian hope promises. Our culture loves the idea of the perfect happiness of a life of amusement and entertainment without having to deal with those who reject us or our chosen leisure activity. That is also hardly what the Christian hope There are some who not so jokingly promises. confess that the idea of an eternity of choir singing or praying or praising God sounds entirely boring and might be cause to choose hell over heaven any day of the week. As the joke goes, at least I will know more people down there. That is also hardly what the Christian hope promises.

The promise that accompanies the resurrection of the body to a new and glorious state and the gift of eternity come with the rehabilitation of the heart so that the things we do on a limited basis today might be desired and done forever. It is not that we will be the same people in a new flesh and at a new address but that what was begun in us and is now complete will be brought to perfect consummation. Translated into English that means that our hearts will change, our desires will change, and the objects of our joy will change. Perhaps that is the problem -- we do not want to be changed. In other words, it is not simply that we find the idea of the resurrection untenable or the idea of heaven unthinkable but that we reject these ideas point blank because we prefer to be who we are even if that would mean suffering something for it. Such is the state of affairs to be pondered by those who preach and teach the Christian faith today. We are more and more wedded to our worldly view of everything, including ourselves, and less inclined toward any version of the future that would require us to surrender that view of ourselves and what we fancy.
