



ANNIVERSARY OF YOUR BAPTISM

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is God's gift to sinners, whereby he gives and places that which Jesus has earned by his life, death, and resurrection, upon those who are baptized into Christ. The gifts of forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and salvation from hell are received by the power of the Holy Spirit and the Word to all baptized into the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. In short, baptism is a big deal for you and should be remembered annually



Baptism forms and shapes the Christian life each day as you repent of your sin. Daily each of us sins much by what we do and by what we don't do. We have sins of commission and sins of omission. By nature, we don't fear, love, and trust in God as we ought and we certainly don't love our neighbor as ourselves. There is too much hatred, anger, and resentment against other people. All of this calls for repentance, contrition, and sorrow over sin. Repent, each one of you, and confess your sinful nature and sins to your heavenly Father.

Baptism turns us daily to Christ Jesus in faith, as we look to Him for the perfect remission of all our sins. His blood daily washes us from our stains and guilt. Jesus is the perfect Son of God, true God and true man, who died on the cross for our sins. By the power of the Holy Spirit we place all our confidence, faith, and hope in Him, for His promises in the Gospels are dear and priceless.

Baptism also brings us newness of life each day



as we live out our faith in the home and community. The Holy Spirit was given in baptism. This Spirit guides and leads us not only to know the will of God, but also to live it in thought, word, and deed. Our Christian lives, as saints of God, are to be lived by thought, word, and deed. Saving faith produces good works that benefit other people in need of our love and mercy. Baptized children of God are eager for good works and desire

to help others, motivated by the free salvation delivered to us in baptism.

The nature, power, and benefits of baptism cannot be overestimated. This is a heavenly washing accomplished by the Holy Spirit, and it brings us the highest good in Christ Jesus.

So, light your baptism candle on the anniversary of your baptism. Display your baptismal certificate as a fitting reminder of what God has done and what He has given you in your baptism.

Rejoice and confess, telling everyone what He has done for you. Give thanks and glory to God for His mercy.

"Almighty God, through the washing of water with the Word we are united with Christ Jesus in His death and resurrection. Grant that I, who have been baptized and redeemed from the old life of sin, may be renewed in Your Holy Spirit and live before You in righteousness and purity forever; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever."


WE NEED YOUR HELP FOR FLOCKNOTE

memorizing scripture

¹¹ Your word I have hidden in my heart, That I might not sin against You. Psalm 119:11

In years past many of you might have had a stack of business sized cards with scripture verses that you planned to memorize. How did you do with these? Or, you might have been encouraged to use 3x5 cards and write out a verse you wanted to memorize. Again, how did you do with that method? For some these were successful methods, but what about today in our world of technology?

Whether your cellphone is on the Apple platform or the Android platform you can find a variety of apps to help you memorize scripture. Go to your app store and type in "scripture memory" or "Bible verse memory" and you will find a good selection of apps. Choose one that you want to try but don't be discouraged if at first you don't really like it. Try another one and another until you find one that clicks with your personal learning style.

Some of the apps include game-like activities and others include rewards of some sort like badges for each verse memorized. One app is based on singing the verse which can be very helpful for some. If competition encourages you find somebody to embark on this activity with you whether it is a family member or a friend.

If you frequently switch between cellphone, tablet or laptop computer make sure that you verify that the app can work on all of your devices. Many say they do, but for some they work great on your phone but have some glitches on a laptop. Decide how you will generally use this app and make sure it works well on that device and if not having an A+ on another device is a deal breaker for that app.

Next time you are tempted to mindlessly scroll through social media click on your Bible memory app and review verses you have memorized or add a new verse to your memory library. Remember that technology can be a godly tool for your life!

ASK THE PASTOR: THE CRUCIFIX (REV. PAUL McCain)

QUESTION: Is the use of a crucifix a uniquely Roman Catholic practice? Doesn't the empty cross provide a better symbol for Lutherans? [Note: A crucifix is a cross with a statue of the crucified Christ on it].

ANSWER: A common misunderstanding among some Lutherans is the opinion that a crucifix, or the use of a crucifix, is a "Roman Catholic" practice. The history of Lutheranism demonstrates that the crucifix was a regular and routine feature of Lutheran worship and devotional life during Luther's lifetime and during the period of Lutheran Orthodoxy. It was also the case among the founding fathers of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. Dr. C.F.W. Walther had a large painting of the crucifix in his study, actually, a particularly grotesque painting. If you were to visit many of the original congregations of the LCMS here in the United States you would find lovely crucifixes adorning their altars, and in addition, beautiful statues on the altar of Christ and the four evangelists, or other such scenes. There is nothing uniquely Roman Catholic about this. Many Lutherans and Lutheran congregations use crucifixes. Crucifixes are displayed prominently in the chapels of both of our seminaries.

Lutheranism has always considered the crucifix to be a powerful reminder of the sacrifice our Lord Jesus made for us and our salvation, on the cross. A crucifix vividly brings to mind the Apostle Paul's divinely inspired words, "We preach Christ and Him crucified" (1 Cor. 1:23). Interestingly enough, while there is certainly nothing "wrong" with an "empty" cross, the practice of using an "empty cross" on a Lutheran congregation's altar comes from non-Lutheran sources. At the time of the Reformation there was conflict between Lutherans and Reformed Christians over the proper place of pictures, images, statues and the like in the church. Lutherans stood with historic Christendom in realizing that such art in the church was not wrong, and was a great aid for helping to focus devotional thoughts on the truth of the Word of God, no greater truth can be found that the death of Jesus Christ our Lord for the world's salvation.

The "empty cross" is not a symbol of Christ's resurrection, as some say, for the fact is that the cross would have been empty regardless of whether or not Christ had risen from the grave. The point to be kept clear here is that both an "empty cross" and a crucifix, symbolize the same thing: the death of Christ our Lord for the salvation of the world. The empty cross is not a symbol of Christ's resurrection, but of his death and crucifixion. Many feel that the crucifix symbolizes this truth more clearly and strikingly. That has been the traditional opinion of

historic Lutheranism, until the last fifty years ago, due to the influence we will now mention.

Some Lutherans began to move away from crucifixes during the age of Lutheran Pietism, which rejected much of Lutheran doctrine and consequently many Lutheran worship practices. At the time, Lutheran Pietists, contrary to the clear position of Luther and the earlier Lutherans, held that symbols such as the crucifix were wrong. This was never the view of historic Lutheranism. Here in America, Lutherans have always felt a certain pressure to "fit in" with the Reformed Christianity that predominates much of the Protestant church here. Thus, for some Lutherans this meant doing away with things such as crucifixes, and vestments, and other traditional forms of Lutheran worship and piety. It is sad when some Lutherans are made to feel embarrassed about their Lutheranism by members of churches that teach the Word of God in error and who do not share Lutheranism's clear confession and practice of the full truth of the Word of God.

Lutheranism has always recognized that the use of any symbol (even the empty cross) can become an idolatrous practice, if in any way people are led to believe there is "power in the cross" or that a picture or representation of a cross has some sort of ability, in itself, to bring us into relationship with Christ and His Gospel. Any of God's good gifts can be turned against Him in this life and become an end in themselves.

Lutherans have never believed that banning or limiting proper artwork in the church is the way to prevent its improper use. Rather, we believe that proper teaching and right use is the best way, and the way that is in keeping with the gift of freedom we have in Christ to use all things to the glory and honor of God. Thus, many Lutherans use and enjoy the crucifix as a meaningful reminder of our Lord's suffering and death.

In short, and this is the most important point of all: there is nothing contrary to God's Holy Word, or our Lutheran Confessions, about the proper use of the crucifix, just as there is nothing wrong with the proper use of an empty cross, or any other church symbol by which we are reminded of the great things God has done for us. We need to guard against quickly dismissing out of hand practices that we believe are "too Roman Catholic" before we more adequately explore their use and history in our own church.

In Christian freedom, we use either the crucifix or an empty cross and should not judge or condemn one another for using either nor not using either symbol of our Lord's sacrifice for our sins.

Genesis 12:1–9 Romans 4:1–8, 13–17 John 3:1–17

THE WORD OF THE GOSPEL OPENS THE EYES OF FAITH AND FIXES THEM ON CHRIST JESUS

The Lord called Abram (Abraham) to leave his home and go to a land that God would show him. He also promised to make of Abram "a great nation," to bless him and make his name great as a blessing to "all the families of the earth" (Gen. 12:2–3). "Abram went, as the LORD had told him" (Gen. 12:4), and in Canaan "he built an altar to the LORD and called upon the name of the LORD" (Gen. 12:8). He "believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness" (Rom. 4:3). Here the grace of God is manifested, that He "justifies the ungodly" (Rom. 4:5), not by works of the Law, but through faith in His promises. He removes all of our sins and lawless deeds through Jesus Christ, the offspring of Abraham in whom all the Lord's promises are realized. This forgiveness of sins is the Word of the Gospel, the voice of the Holy Spirit, which "gives life to the dead" (Rom. 4:17). It opens the eyes of faith to behold Christ Jesus, the Son of Man lifted up on the cross, "that whoever believes in him may have eternal life" (John 3:14–15).

THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

(12 March 2022)

Exodus 17:1–7 Romans 5:1–8 John 4:5–26 (27–30, 39–42)

WE WORSHIP THE FATHER OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST IN THE SPIRIT AND TRUTH OF HIS GOSPEL

Though the Lord had brought them out of Egypt, "all the congregation of the people of Israel" grumbled against Him because "there was no water for the people to drink" (Ex. 17:1). Despite their quarreling, the Lord graciously provided for them. He did not strike the people for their sins, but by the hand of Moses He struck the rock instead and brought forth water for the people. In the same way, living water flows from the pierced side of Christ at "about the sixth hour" (John 4:6; 19:14), when He is lifted up on the cross for the sins of the world. He is "the gift of God" (John 4:10), the well from which the Holy Spirit is poured out and becomes in His people "a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14). By this grace in which we stand, being at peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, we "worship the Father in spirit and truth" (John 4:23). "We rejoice in hope of the glory of God" because "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom. 5:2, 5).

Isaiah 42:14–21 Ephesians 5:8–14 John 9:1–41 or John 9:1–7, 13–17, 34–39

BY HIS WORD OF THE GOSPEL, JESUS CALLS US OUT OF THE DARKNESS INTO HIS MARVELOUS LIGHT

The Lord is grieved by the spiritual blindness of His people, yet in mercy He does not forsake them. He restrains His anger and keeps His peace, until He opens their ears and eyes to hear and see Him. "For his righteousness' sake," He magnifies His Word and makes it glorious in the coming of Christ Jesus (Is. 42:21). Jesus turns "the darkness before them into light" (Is. 42:16) because He is "the light of the world" (John 9:5). The incarnate Son of God does the works of His Father and displays the divine glory in His own flesh "while it is day," until that night "when no one can work" (John 9:4). By the washing of water with His Word, He opens the eyes of the blind and grants rest to the weary. Therefore, though "at one time you were darkness," now "you are light in the Lord" (Eph. 5:8). By our Baptism into Christ, we live in the eternal day of His resurrection, wherein He shines upon us. As often as we fall back into the darkness of sin, He calls us by the Gospel to "awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead" (Eph. 5:14).

FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

(26 March 2023)

Ezekiel 37:1–14 Romans 8:1–11

John 11:1-45 (46-53) or John 11:17-27, 38-53

JESUS CHRIST IS THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE

The illness and death of Lazarus happened "that the Son of God may be glorified through it" (John 11:4). Jesus' miracle of raising Lazarus prompted His arrest and crucifixion, whereby He would die "for the nation" and gather "into one the children of God who are scattered abroad" (John 11:51-52). As He called Lazarus from the tomb and commanded others to "unbind him, and let him go" (John 11:44), Jesus also calls us and releases us from the bondage of sin and death. We would not "submit to God's law," nor could we "please God" (Rom. 8:7-8), but "he condemned sin" in His own flesh so "that the righteous requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us" (Rom. 8:3-4). Now through the Gospel, "the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells" in us (Rom. 8:11). His Word breathes His Spirit into our mortal flesh, animating us with His own life. As His ministers preach according to His divine command, the Lord Jesus calls us from the grave into the good land that He gives us (Ezek. 37:12, 14).

LECTIONARY SUMMARIES

PALM SUNDAY / SUNDAY OF THE PASSION

(2 April 2023)

Isaiah 50:4–9a Philippians 2:5–11 John 12:12–19 (Procession) Matthew 26:1—27:66 or Matthew 27:11–66 or John 12:20–43

Now Is the Hour When the Son of Man Is Glorified

"Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming." He comes in gentle humility, "sitting on a donkey's colt," yet also as the King of Israel "in the name of the Lord" (John 12:13, 15). His royal glory is faithful obedience and self-sacrificing service "to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 2:8). The love of God is manifested in the cross and Passion of His Son for the salvation of sinners. Since He has borne our sins and suffered our death, "God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name" (Phil. 2:9), and He exalts us in His resurrection. Our Lord did not hide His face "from disgrace and spitting" (Is. 50:6), but He trusted His God and Father, who raised Him from death and the grave and exalted Him to His right hand. This same King Jesus now comes to us in gentle humility in His Supper, where He feeds us with His body and cleanses and covers us with His blood, so that "after his resurrection" we also shall rise and enter the holy city (Matt. 27:52–53).

EASTER DAY (9 April 2023)

Acts 10:34–43 or Jeremiah 31:1–6 Colossians 3:1–4 Matthew 28:1–10

The Victory of Christ Crucified Is Given to You in the Preaching of His Resurrection

Every Sunday is the Lord's day, the day of His resurrection, "after the Sabbath, toward the dawn of the first day of the week" (Matt. 28:1). In the Divine Service, the Church enters upon the eternal "eighth day." The Lord Jesus, "who was crucified," who "has risen, as he said" (Matt. 28:5–6), is the firstborn from the dead and the firstfruits of the new creation. Because "you have died" with Him in Holy Baptism, "you have been raised with Christ" and "your life is hidden with Christ in God" (Col. 3:1, 3). The Lord Jesus has become our God, as surely as He is "the God of all the clans of Israel," and we now belong to His people (Jer. 31:1). In this, He "shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34), but "everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name" (Acts 10:43). As "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power" and "raised him on the third day," He also raises us up and pours out His Spirit upon us through the Gospel (Acts 10:38, 40).



SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER (16 April 2023)

Acts 5:29–42 1 Peter 1:3–9 John 20:19–31

CHRIST JESUS BREATHES HIS SPIRIT AND HIS LIFE INTO US BY THE MINISTRY OF THE GOSPEL

The crucified and risen Lord Jesus establishes the ministry of the Gospel in order to bestow His lifegiving Holy Spirit and His peace upon the Church. To those who are called and ordained to this office, and to those they serve in His name, He grants the Holy Absolution of all sins. By the fruits of His cross, He replaces fear and doubt with peace and joy, and thus gives "repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins" (Acts 5:31). Through the preaching of His sent ones, He calls us to believe that He "is the Christ, the Son of God," so that by such faith we "may have life in his name" (John 20:31). In His resurrection, we have the "living hope" to which we have been "born again" and by which we are guarded "for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (1 Peter 1:3, 5). Until then, "though you have not seen him, you love him," and by the mercies of God "you believe in him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory" (1 Peter 1:8).

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER (23 April 2023)

Acts 2:14a, 36–41 1 Peter 1:17–25 Luke 24:13–35

THE RISEN LORD JESUS IS WITH US IN HOLY BAPTISM AND IN 'THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD'

From "before the foundation of the world" until heaven and earth pass away, "the word of the Lord remains forever" (1 Peter 1:20, 25). This "living and abiding word of God" is the preaching of Christ Jesus, namely that God "raised him from the dead and gave him glory" (1 Peter 1:21, 23). By this living word, we "have been born again" to eternal life (1 Peter 1:23) and ransomed from our sinful and mortal life "with the precious blood of Christ" (1 Peter 1:18– 19). This living word also calls us to repentance, to dying and rising in Holy Baptism "in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins" (Acts 2:38). In this, we receive the Holy Spirit "for you and for your children and for all who are far off" (Acts 2:39). Through the preaching of His cross and resurrection, Jesus draws near to bring us "into his glory" (Luke 24:26). As He opens the Scriptures, He opens our minds to comprehend "the things concerning himself" (Luke 24:27), and He brings us to know Him "in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:35).

LECTIONARY SUMMARIES (CONTINUED)

FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER (30 April 2023)

Acts 2:42–47 1 Peter 2:19–25 John 10:1–10

THE CRUCIFIED AND RISEN LORD JESUS CHRIST IS OUR GOOD SHEPHERD

Although we "were straying like sheep," the Lord Jesus Christ has willingly suffered and died for us, bearing our sins "in his body on the tree" (1 Peter 2:24–25). We are healed by His wounds (1 Peter 2:24), and in His resurrection He gathers us to Himself as our Good Shepherd, by whose "have life and righteousness we have abundantly" (John 10:10). Now through other shepherds whom He calls and sends in His name, He guards and keeps us in the green pastures of His Church, leading us beside the quiet waters of our Baptism and spreading the feast of His table before us. Since He has called us by the Gospel to be His own dear sheep, we also "hear his voice" and "know his voice" (John 10:3-4) in the faithful preaching of His Gospel, and we follow Him by faith. When we receive His Gospel, we have the abundant life and common unity of the entire flock under one Good Shepherd, in "the apostles' teaching and the fellowship" and in "the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42).



THE TIME OF EASTER LENT

Begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with midday prayer on Holy Saturday.



The Time of Easter invites us into the story of Jesus' sacrificial death and His glorious resurrection. The resurrection of Jesus gives proof that our salvation has been completed and that our hope for eternal life with God is secure.

Easter was the major celebration of the Early Church, which also set aside a period of preparation to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection of Our Lord (Easter). Lent was a period of preparation first prescribed for baptismal candidates. During this period, the candidates were examined in preparation for Baptism at the Easter (or Paschal) Vigil. Later, these forty days were associated with Jesus' forty days in the desert prior to His temptation (Matthew 4:1–11) and with the forty years the children of Israel spent in the wilderness (Numbers 14:34), becoming a period of preparation for every Christian.

The Sundays during this season are not "of Lent" but "in Lent." Thus the Sundays retain an Easter tone and may be less solemn than the mid-

week services that congregations typically offer. The observances of Lent are concrete reminders of the greater solemnity of this season, yet Lutherans emphasize the Gospel of Christ as central even to this penitential season.

In Lent, we prepare our hearts to receive our crucified and risen Lord.



LENT PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The church is decorated in violet, the color of royalty and repentance. This period
 of repentance is marked by a purposeful turning away from our sin and turning
 toward Christ for His mercy and forgiveness.
- Ash Wednesday begins the observance of Lent. Ashes on the forehead is a sign
 of penitence and a reminder that we, too, shall die and therefore need forgiveness
 from Jesus. Black may be used to decorate the church on Ash Wednesday.
- Alleluia is the Hebrew word for "Praise the Lord." It is a joyous expression of faith in God. During Lent, we forego using this joyous response in order to focus on our need for repentance and faith.
- As in Advent, so in Lent, we do not sing the Gloria in Excelsis in the Divine Service.
 We do this to focus our worship on repentance.
- Fasting is giving up eating at a particular meal or time in order to devote that time to prayer and meditation on the Word of God.
- Many churches observe Lent by gathering for midweek services. These additional times of worship and gathering around God's Word help us prepare to observe Holy Week and celebrate Easter.

THE TIME OF EASTER EASTER AND ITS SEASON

Begins with evening prayer on Holy Saturday and ends with midday prayer on Pentecost.



Easter is not merely a one-day celebration; it is a fifty-day season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season—one seventh of the year—is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.

The first celebration of Easter is the Easter Vigil, the evening of Holy Saturday. The Vigil includes a service of light, in which fire symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world. The service is designed to take the Christian from the solemnity of Good Friday to the predawn joy of Easter.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Congregations may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ, as well as services that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. While not as lavish, this joyous and celebratory tone echoes down through the Sundays of the Easter season.

Forty days after Easter, the Church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by early Christians to commemorate the first great harvest of believers for Christ. Thus, Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian Church, as the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and they gave their compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. The color for the Day for Pentecost is red, representing fire and blood. Red recalls the tongues of fire received on the first Pentecost and the martyrs who shed their blood for the faith.

During Easter, we rejoice in our salvation.

EASTER PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The colors of Easter are white and gold. White, the color our Lord's holiness, is
 everywhere on Easter, from the paraments and vestments to the traditional Easter
 lilies. Gold decorations remind us that our resurrection life in Christ is precious and
 eternal
- After a long absence in Lent, Alleluia returns at Easter and is heard everywhere in the propers appointed for the weeks after Easter. Also, the joyous Hymn of Praise and the Gloria Patri return and are sung as part of the liturgy once again.
- During the Easter season, we greet one another with a special Easter greeting and response: "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"
