from the Pastor...

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace, mercy, and peace to you in the year of our Lord 2024! I hope you have been enjoying the 12 days of Christmas. It is unfortunate that one of the most joyous seasons of the church year, Christmas, is also the shortest. And because of how Christmas fell on a Monday this year and Epiphany falls on a Saturday, it makes the Christmas season feel even shorter. There was only one Sunday after Christmas. At least in 2025 we can look forward to two Sundays after Christmas. But I'm getting way ahead of myself at this point.

Despite how short it feels, thankfully the joy of the Christmas season continues in the season of Epiphany. There is joy and brightness as we hear about and meditate on miracles, teachings, and other events from Jesus' life in the Epiphany readings and hymns. But this year, because Easter is early, this also means a short Epiphany season. By the time of the next newsletter in fact, we will already be well into the Lenten season. That's the nature of the Christian life, though. It is very cyclical. Daily we die to sin and live to righteousness in our Baptisms. Weekly we repent of our sins and receive God's gifts of forgiveness and salvation in the Divine Service. And seasonally and yearly we move through the Church Year, focusing on the law and the gospel of Christ's ministry and how this affects the Spirit working in our lives.

Now usually in these articles, I try to focus on a central thought or theme. But this time, maybe due to exhaustion from Advent and Christmas, or more than likely from a little bit of procrastination, I simply can't come up with a good central thought.

Nonetheless, in the spirit of this being the new year, I'll continue by thinking on things past and things to come.

Regarding things past, I did want to speak briefly about the orientation for the new pastor's program which I attended in the Bay Area all the way back in mid-October. Overall it was nice to connect with other new pastors and just talk about ministry and life away from the seminary. There were many different

presentations, and I would say I learned at least one thing to ponder from each of these presentations. One big part of this program is about doing ministry

in our specific context, so I have especially been pondering this as it relates to our context here at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Chico in Northern California.

Also regarding things past, I just want to say thank you again for your monetary gifts at

Christmas and also your prayers, encouragement, and patience in my first six months here.

Learning how to be a pastor may start in the seminary, but it can only be finished by the Holy Spirit in the school of experience. I give thanks to God for calling me here to this school of experience, and I give thanks to God for all of you who are encouraging and patient as I gain that experience.

Regarding things to come, Abby and I look forward to getting to know you better this year so that we can best pray for you and so that I can best be Christ's undershepherd to you. We would especially be open to sharing a meal with you somewhere or just sitting and talking with you somewhere in order to get to know you even better. Abby and I also look forward to having a spring and summer where we are not moving so that we can spend time getting to know the area we call home.

Also regarding things to come, not this year but next year, 2025, our congregation will celebrate 100 years of officially being a congregation. In light of that, we may want to begin preparing for a 100th anniversary celebration. In order to do that, we should take time in 2024 to give thanks for our past, continue to receive Christ's gifts of Word and Sacrament in the present, and look forward to the future, and not just a celebration in 2025, but the future work of Christ in this congregation until He comes again. Indeed, though the joyful and bright Christmas and Epiphany seasons of 2024 seem short, the past, present, and future work of Christ in this congregation is bright. May that joy, as well as the light of Christ, be yours in this new year! The Lord be with you,

Happy New Year, again! Your children have all heard people talk about the New Year. They have probably heard about New Year's resolutions and making changes in the New Year. At school their teachers have probably talked about what the class will be learning and doing in the New Year. But...did you and your family talk about Advent being the beginning of the church year?

You may have seen a copy at church, but did you know that you can find the church year calendar and various resources for worship not only at church but also at home? Go to: https://www.lcms.org/worship/church-year

This is only a starting point. You might want to print out the calendar for the year so that you can learn more about the colors of the seasons of the church year. Also, at cph.org you can find some useful books for your children. One such book is *Ordering Our Days in His Peace* by Elizabeth Murphy.



While this book is listed in the children's section of Concordia Publishing there will be enough to interest the whole family as the author walks through the church year and why we do the things that we do. It would also be appropriate for an adult who has no background in a liturgical church as it is not written in a childish way but clearly explained.

There are two other books in this series. Behold the Lamb: An Introduction to the Signs and Symbols of the Church and Worshipping with Angels and Archangels: An Introduction to the Devine Service.

Why not make this year the year you as a family learn more about the why and how and when of our wonderful liturgy? Don't forget to ask your Pastor to explain things to you that you don't understand.

TECHNOLOGY



Technology... something new?

While it is not new, started in 2013, the LCMS Mobile App is worth looking at. Previously you may have had links to various pieces of the app but it now has several sources all in one place: news, media, daily devotional, and locate church or school. There have recently been several small bug fixes so the app is more stable. It is available on both Apple and Android platforms.

For those of you who have and use the app PrayNow it appears that CPH will no longer be supporting this app and it has been removed from sale. If you have it you can continue using it until it stops working. There will be no further updates.

CPH has launched a new app based on Treasury of Daily Prayer, *InPrayer*, but currently it is only available on the Apple platform. An Android version is scheduled for Spring 2024. The cost of this app will be available as a subscription or a one-time purchase. Cost unknown though some research seems to show 3rd party free downloads though not sure if that is full version.




Retirement Gift





THE TIME OF CHRISTMAS
EPIPHANY AND ITS SEASON

Begins with evening prayer on January 5 and ends the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday.

Epiphany is one of the oldest seasons in the Christian Church Year, second only to the Easter season. This season of lights emphasizes Jesus' manifestation (or epiphany, from the Greek epiphaneia) as God and man. The earliest Christians called the Feast of the Epiphany the Theophany ("revelation of God"). When the Gentile Magi come to worship Jesus, they show that everyone now has access to God. Now all people, Jew and Gentile, can come to God's temple to worship, because Jesus is the new temple: God in the flesh. The epiphany of Our Lord (January 6) marks the celebration of the visit of the Magi.

Epiphany may include as many as nine Sundays, depending on the date of easter. The season is marked at its beginning and at its end by two important feasts of Christ.



During Epiphany, we worship Jesus, who has given all mankind access to God through Himself.

Matthew 2:10-12 Matthew 3:13-17 John 2:1-11

EPIPHANY PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- Like Christmas, the Epiphany of Our Lord, the Baptism of our Lord, and the Transfiguration of Our Lord are feast days of Jesus. The color for feast days is white, the color of divinity, purity, and joy. The Sundays after the Epiphany focus on the growth of Jesus' ministry, and the color green is used to symbolize that growth.
- On the First Sunday after the Epiphany, the Church celebrates the Baptism of Our Lord. The Father sent Jesus to bear the sins of the world. So Jesus steps down into baptismal waters so that He can soak up the sins of the world: He is baptized into our sins so that our Baptism might be into His death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins.
- ◆ The Feast of the Transfiguration, celebrated on the las Sunday in the Epiphany season, is a significant and uniquely Lutheran contribution to the Christian calendar. This festival commemorates the moment on the Mount of Transfiguration when three of Jesus' disciples glimpse their Lord in divine splendor, seeing Him as the center of the Law (Moses) and the Prophets (Elijah). Jesus proclaims to His disciples, then and now, that He is the long-awaited one who has come to die for the sins of the world and be raised again in glory.
- The Transfiguration of Our Lord is the las Sunday before Lent. Because we give up singing *Alleluia* during Lent, at the close of the service on Transfiguration we say farewell to *Alleluia* with the hymn "Alleluia, Song of Gladness" (LSB 417).
